

Crime prevention program now on in Terrace Bay

The Terrace Bay Police Force's Operation Provident is now entering its second phase with the distribution of outdoor stickers for businesses in town which warn potential thieves that items of value inside have been marked for police identifications.

Police Chief Russ Phillips explained that the first stage of the program was the actual identification of valuable material by engraving a special number on such equipment.

The crime prevention program entered its second phase last week as Operation Provident stickers were given to the manager of Berglund Industrial Supply Company on Mill Road in Terrace Bay. The company was one of the last to have its equipment marked with its own unique sequential identifying

number, and the first to receive the access point decals.

According to Const. Ron Fewer, the operation has been in existence throughout all of Canada for a number of years.

"Operation Provident was developed from the concern expressed over the annual hundreds of millions of dollars from businesses, government offices, schools, and other facilities, (such as) churches, community centres, and municipal buildings," Const. Fewer explained.

In addition to deterrence, the operation can also assist in the recovery of lost or stolen property, he added.

Terrace Bay Police Report

Terrace Bay Police Report for the week of March 1 to March 7, 1986:

Terrace Bay Police investigated three motor vehicle accidents in the past week all involving damages under \$700. Two of the accidents were hit and runs and are still under

investigation.

Schreiber OPP were assisted regarding a motor vehicle accident and also in connection with a stolen automobile which resulted in several charges being laid under the Criminal Code by the police.

Welfare assistance was given to a motorist passing

through the area. Several parking tickets were issued for parking in the Handicapped and other no parking areas.

Police assisted Kimberly Clark in attempting to locate one of their employees who had not been available for work.

All members of the Terrace Bay Police Force have spent considerable time the past few weeks organizing and attempting to implement several new Community Police Programs, such as Operation Identification outlined below.

What is Operation Identification?
Operation Identification is a program designed to discourage theft of valuables from your home and other locations, and provide a way to easily identify stolen property.

The program has dramatically reduced the profit in stolen goods. Marked articles are difficult to dispose of and are easily traced. Thus if it is advertised that your articles

are protected by Operation Identification, you'll less likely be victimized. Operation Identification works whether your property is stolen or lost. Proper identification makes it easier for Police to return personal property.

How Do You Join Operation Identification?

Operation Identification is joined by contacting your local Police. Once you have contacted the Police you will be loaned an electric engraver, free of charge. At this time you will also receive an Operation Identification Record Sheet to record serial numbers and model numbers of those items you choose to mark, that already have serial numbers.

Once your items have been marked, and you are finished with the engraver,

on its return to the Police Office you will be given sufficient Operation Identification decals to place at your main entrances to indicate that your valuables have been marked.

In Terrace Bay, we are going to use your Social Insurance Number as a number to mark your valuables. The reason for using this number is that your Social Insurance Number belongs to you personally and will be with you a lifetime.

Operation Identification is a Community venture into a Property Identification and Inventory System that will work to protect you and your property.
