

Study to be conducted following vandalism complaint

Terrace Bay Township Council agreed at its meeting on April 14 to conduct a study of all townsite walkways and easements after two residents submit-

ted a letter in which they complained of vandalism to their property resulting from the public use of an adjacent easement.

Rudi and Leslie Samp of

607 Lakeview Drive in Terrace Bay appeared at the meeting in person to read their letter, and demanded that the town provide and install a fence

for their property.

The couple also asked Council to cover all costs for repairs at the site, which have been estimated at up to \$1,400.

Town engineer Doug Baker said he would look into the town's policy of access to parks as well as the actual costs for repairs. Larry Simons, clerk-

treasurer, explained that the easement in question runs into an open area that exists between Lakeview Drive and Superior Avenue.

Baker was later instructed to conduct a survey, which was to begin immediately.

sand, rocks, nails, and broken glass into our driveway," Mrs. Samp told Council. During the winter, motorized vehicles are "constantly driving back and forth" in the area, causing noise pollution at all hours.

The couple said they regret being forced into the position of demanding that the easement be closed, even to those who operated their vehicles in a responsible matter.

Later in the meeting, Council passed a motion declaring the week of April 20-26 as Forest Fire Prevention Week in Terrace Bay.

needs for such fiber.

Earlier in the speech, Smith explained that even though pulp prices are firming, "we foresee little probability that they will be high enough in relation to costs to produce a rate of return which might be reasonably expected to justify the massive commitment of capital required to sustain operations" in Terrace Bay.

According to Chisholm and other sources, the Terrace Bay pulp plant has been losing money for approximately four years, though the company as a whole made a profit last year. The main difficulty is

that pulp is being made cheaper elsewhere in the world. Kimberly-Clark operates mills in many other countries, including Australia, Chile, and Portugal.

One source at the Terrace Bay mill, who wished to remain anonymous, felt the final study conclusions might call for nothing

worse than cost cutting measures. He added that with such a course, layoffs would not take place at the mill.

Township Reeve Ollie Chapman met with mill manager Jack Lavallet on April 17, and told the News that the meeting was just a matter of the company keeping public of-

ficials up to date on the matter. Lavallet is also the president of the company in Canada.

Lavallet and many

others will be contacted to take part in Smith's study, Chisholm said. He did not say when that study is expected to be completed.

Councillor Jim Ziegler, who was not present at the April 14 meeting, still has Recreation, Police, and

Personnel and Policy. Reeve Chapman will serve as Finance Chairman until Joubert becomes familiar with the role. She also serves on the EMP Executive.

A letter from the Kimberly-Clark pulp mill in Terrace Bay sparked an extended discussion on the ongoing problem of garbage in the Radisson Avenue area, behind Simcoe Plaza in town.

"Radisson has been in an absolutely deplorable condition," Councillor Romanuk explained. "There's nothing new about that, but we don't know what to do about it... we've looked at different things and solutions."

"I wonder if we could write a letter to the merchants and ask for their cooperation on this," Reeve Chapman said.

"We are not prepared to tolerate this too much longer," Councillor Ramsay noted. "What response are we going to get from another letter?"

Councillor Joubert explained that Radisson is often treated like a back alley by the businesses which front on Simcoe Plaza, and pointed out that there are some stores which actually face Radisson.

Reeve Chapman then suggested that the town's garbage bylaw should be pulled out and reviewed in the near future.

"We are not interested in confrontation, just co-operation," Ramsay said.


