## Spray needed, says Chamber

Time is running out for 70,000 acres of Northwestern Ontario forest-areas which Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) officials estimate will be destroyed by budworm unless treated with chemical sprays in 1986.

MNR officials previously recommended the use of chemical sprays in remote areas, but only when forests were in a "last leg" situation, i.e. they could not withstand another season's attack by the bud-

worm. In these situations, because of their greater chance of failure, biological sprays were not recommended.

According to a recent news release from the Northwestern Ontario Associated Chambers of Commerce, the chemical sprays proposed for use by the MNR are among the most widely used pesticide for human food crops in the world. These are considered safe even for food crops at application rates

many times greater than those proposed by the MNR for the forests.

Unfortunately, due to pressure from both opposition parties, the Ontario Government has cancelled the limited chemical spray program proposed by the MNR, the release added.

Associations representing nearly all the municipalities and Chambers of Commerce in Northwestern Ontario have joined MNR officials, the Lakehead Region Conser-

vation Authority, several Liberal and Progressive Conservative Riding Associations and the forestry industry to ask Vince Kerrio, the Ontario Minister of Natural Resources, to rescind his decision and to authorize the original spray program to proceed.

This week the Northwestern Ontario Associated Chambers of Commerce is appealing to the public to write or call their local provincial member to ask for his support.

"We don't have much political power in the North," said Doug Scott, President of the Northwestern Ontario Associated Chambers of Commerce, "but thousands of jobs may be at stake here. It is terribly important that as many voices be heard as possible."
