

Bike safety



CI Program on

The Terrace Bay Kinsmen Club, in conjunction with the Terrace Bay Police Force, will be offering a Child Identification Program in the townsite next week, according a news report released last month.

This program will be available during Police Week, which is May 11 to May 17 this year. There will be a booth at the Terrace Bay Curling Lounge on May 13 and 15 from p.m. to 4 p.m. and from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at which time a parent may bring their child in.

Members of the Kinsmen Club and the town Police Force will be on hand to photograph and fingerprint any child who is brought in for the program.

There is a fee for this service, which is \$2 per child or \$5 per family. A 9 by 12 envelope will be provided for the parents. This envelope is kept not by the Kinsmen or Police, but by the parents themselves, the release noted, adding that no one but the parents will have a copy of these prints, photographs, or envelope.

This Child Identification Program is being offered by the Kinsmen in answer to the concern expressed by numerous parents in Terrace Bay and other communities. Many other municipalities have adopted this type of Child Identfication. The release noted that your support of the program would be appreciated.
