

continued from page 1 and all open fires are still banned in all parts of Northern Ontario.

At the peak of the forest fire at about 4 p.m., there were at least 75 firefighters at the scene, with five water bombers and eight helicopters helping out from the air, he explained.

At the same time there were also a number of people at the MNR District Office helping out with supplies and other support.

Strassburger admitted that the fire was very much a "close call" at some town homes, particularly on Cavanaugh Crescent.

"It was really nip and tuck there," he said. The blaze crept right up to the backyards of some homes, including Martinez's.

Martinez noted that her house survived unscathed, though some ash did fall on the roof.

"People thought my house burned down," she noted. The flames were so large and so close to her home that at one point it appeared the fire was coming from the building.

Nickleson credited quick action by MNR water fire crews and water bombers, municipal fire crews from Terrace Bay and Schreiber, Kimberly-Clark forest industry employees, the town Police Force and support staff for containing the fire.

Bob Cockerline, fire boss for the Ministry, said he had nothing but praise for all involved.

"We had eight five-man fire crews on the fire at its peak," he said in the MNR release. "Other crews were arriving during the day from other disricts."

He estimated the loss of forest area at about 250 hectares


close to it.
