Rosspport Report

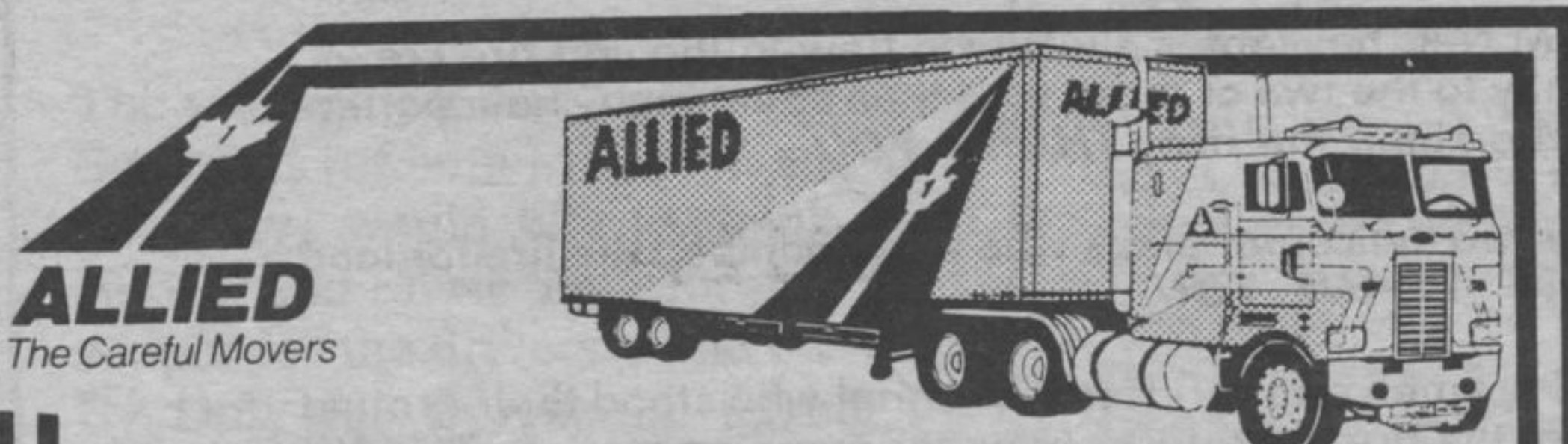
