


Santa in spring?

### School budget passed

Terrace Bay Separate School supporters will be faced with an increase in their taxes of just over four per cent, while those in Schreiber will get away with an increase of just .40 per cent, according to a recent news release.

School Baord set its 1986 budget at a meeting held earlier this month. The total estimated expenditure for the year is just under \$5.5 million, an increase of 9.4 per cent over 1985.

The release noted that the majority of the increase is due to the expanded enrolment in Marathon and Manitouwadge as a result of the Hemlo gold mine development in that area.

Operating grants from

the provincial Ministry of Education have increased 11.4 per cent over the 1985 figures and account for almost 80 per cent of the Board's total revenues, the release added.

It also pointed out that separate school mill rates are at least one mill lower than public elementary mill rates, set earlier this year.

tes, set earlier this year. Manitouwadge faces the largest increase in the Board's area of jurisdiction with a 9.93 per cent hike. Nakina has the next highest increase at 5.96 per cent, with Nipigon at 3.39, Marathon at .20 and no change for Red Rock.

The Board operates English language elementary schools in Schreiber, Nakina, Terrace Bay, Manitouwadge, Marathon, Nipigon and Red Rock, and French language schools in Terrace Bay, Nakina, Manitouwadge and Marathon.



million annually to forest
fire control. The government also loses stumpage
revenue from destroyed
timber stands, and incurs
the costs of regenerating

the burned-over areas. In a bad fire season, firefighting costs can easily double.
