Master Plan going ahead

Schreiber Council, at its August 12 meeting, passed a motion which will allow work to begin on a Recreation Master Plan for the township.

"The Master Plan will give us all the information we need for long-term budgeting and capital expenditures," Ron Larivee, town recreation co-ordinator explained to Council.

He added that the plan could be a five or ten year one, and that an outside consultant will be hired to write it at a cost which could reach \$30,000, depending on the terms of reference, which are prepared by the municipality itself prior to actual work on the plan.

"This plan will tell us where we should put our money," Larivee said. "It will involve three public meetings for input."

Ian Smith of the Ministry of Tourism and Recreation was also on hand at the meeting to answer queries, and he told Council that his Ministry looks very favourably on municipality's which have such a plan

when it comes time to give out grants and recreation funding.

He also reminded Council that the Ministry will fund up to 75 per cent of the plan's expenses.

Smith said Schreiber's share of the cost would therefore be approximately \$6,000.

"This plan would be a good benefit to the community," he said. "I would recommend that you do it at once."

Larivee explained that the terms of reference will be ready before the end of this year. Then the plan itself will be tendered out by March and the contractor eventually hired will start work by April or May of 1987.

"The plan would then be

ready by Christmas of next year," he added.

A resolution appointing the Parks and Recreation Committee as a study team to formulate the plan was then passed by Council. An upper limit of \$30,000 for the plan was also included in the resolution.

In other Council matters brought up at the meeting, Council also passed a motion to increase the rental fees of the hall and arena at the Recreation Complex.

The motion was required because at a recent wedding held at the Complex, the total expenses were almost \$1,100 while Council only took in just over \$900 in rental fees.

"We subsidized that wedding for \$165," Councillor Bob Krause pointed

out. "At first, I was quite critical of any increase (in fees), but not now."

"It shocked me too when we did the breakdown on what we are actually spending," Larivee said after the motion was passed.

Krause also told Council that there is "a severe shortage" of officers at the Ontario Provincial Police Schreiber detachment.

"They are supposed to have a complement of eight here, but we're now down to five (officers)," he explained. "In fact, during the summer we were down to three for a while."

Council decided to meet with an OPP representative this week to see if there is anything it can do to solve the problem.

Locals win trophy

The Schreiber Fire Department went home with the top trophy from the second annual North Shore Firemen's Competition on August 2, hosted by the Manitowadge Fire Department.

A total of four district fire departments took part in the event. Along with the host team and Schreiber were squads from Hurkett and White River, according to Fire Prevention Officer Dave Bellamy.

By winning the competition, Schreiber won the

right to host the event next year, Bellamy added.

Each team was made up of five members, and all four teams took part in three different games. The first game involved a 250 foot hose lay and required five targets to be knocked down.

The second game called for four team members to run with a 15 foot ladder toward a 10 foot frame and rest the ladder against the frame. One team member would take the hose and nozzle to the top of the lad-

der to knock down targets while the other members of the team would hold the ladder and hose in place, and turn on the water.

The third and final game was a bucket brigade. Each team had to fill a 45 gallon drum using buckets, drawing from a port-a-tank approximately 25 feet away.

Bellamy explained that the final score revealed Schreiber had the best total time for the three events. That team was presented with a trophy by one of the judges, Thunder Bay's Fire Chief Jack Bryant.
