Here are the final dates and times for the community outreach pickup and dropoff for this coming weekend in Terrace Bay.

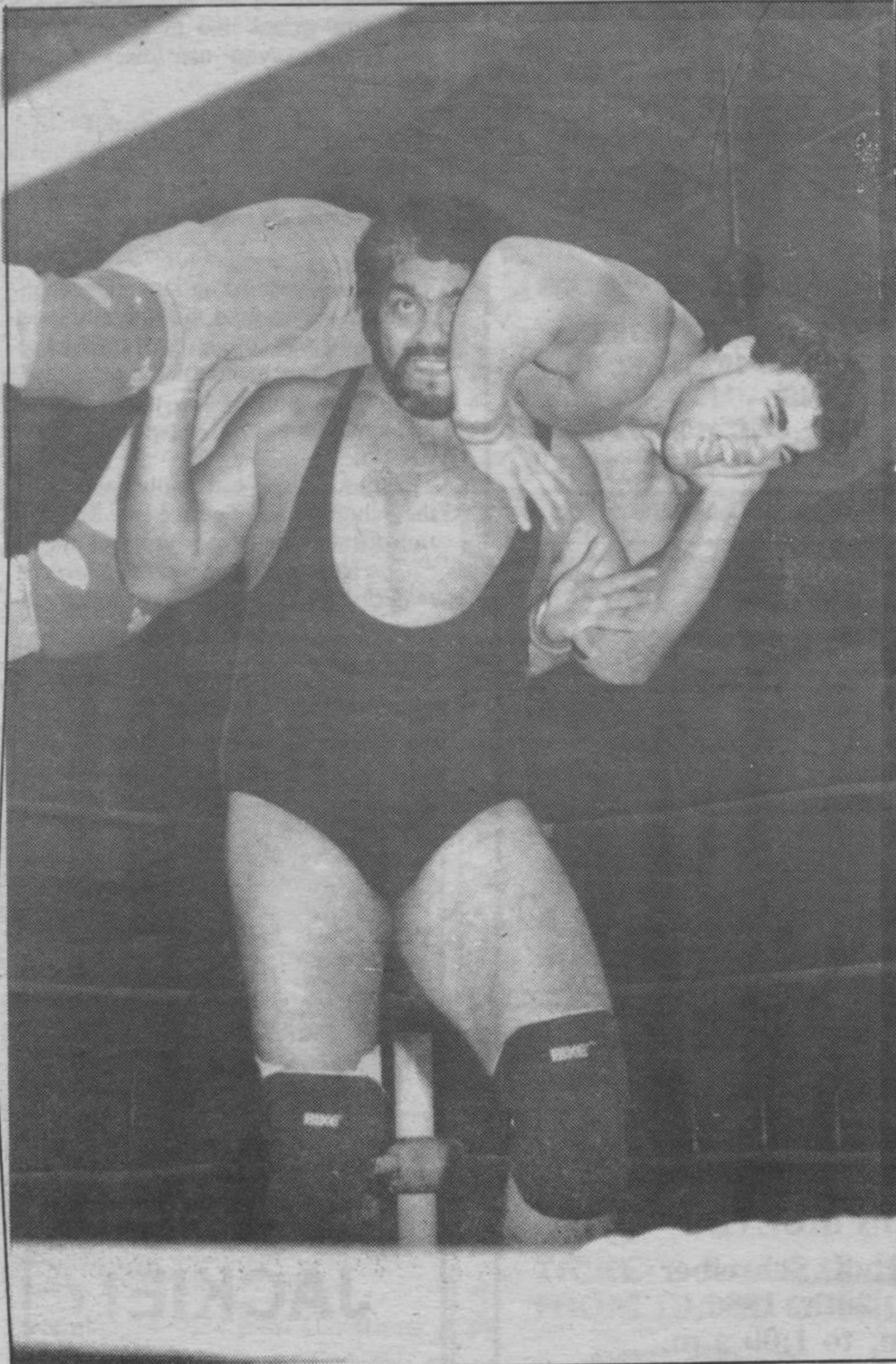
Friday, Dec. 12: The fire hall will be open and a van will be at Simcoe Plaza for dropoffs from 2-6 p.m.
