Triumph is a refreshing shower of

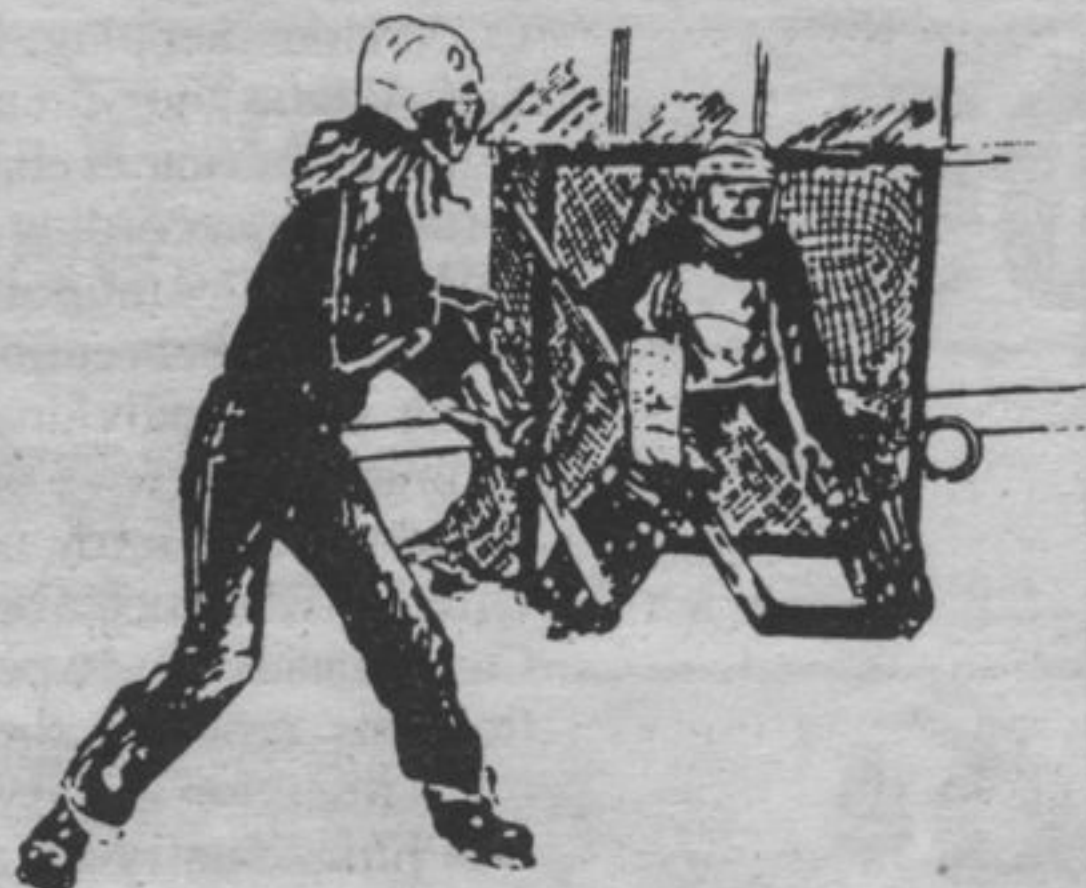
living water, communicating optimism in a world of pessimists.
