He thought that if he was a better boy, his dad wouldn't yell anymore.

Joe felt lonely, confused and ashamed. As he walked, he met several different creatures. He met a farmer whose seeds would not grow because there was not enough rain. The farmer felt helpless to do anything and Joe realized that was like him- he felt helpless to do anything about his dad's drinking problem.
