Grand opening special

To celebrate the opening of his game, Rogerson is having a grand opening special. During the Victoria Day weekend, it will be half the normal cost to play the game for persons who have never played it before.

Rogerson will be booking teams of five but if team of 10 applies, he will take the booking.

The regular price to play will pay for the first 30 rounds, one sealed tube cartridge, the pistol rental and camouflage clothing (optional).

Rogerson said this year he will require a \$50 dollar deposit for teams of five that book. This is due to people not showing up. Rogerson said this happened last year.

Rogerson will be running evening games from 6-9 p.m. during the week and anytime on the weekends.

He will also take full-day bookings if people want to play that long (8-hour games). The minimum game-length is three hours long.

"There is no choice"- Beaulieu

hopeful for th future of mill

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Renauld Beaulieu, mayor of Longlac, told the News that when the Kimberly-Clark sawmill closes on May 15, 80 per cent of Longlac's workforce will be unemployed.

He said that at present, there is one interested party in buying the sawmill but that nothing is official. He is positive though that the mill will be sold.

Beaulieu said the community realizes a different approach must be taken to see what can be done to save the sawmill.

Approximately 100 workers will be laid off when the sawmill shuts down on May 15. This number includes truck drivers and about 59 workers in the sawmill itself Beaulieu said.

"It is serious," he said.

Beaulieu noted that it could be year or more before anything gets rolling but he is hopeful someone will take over the mill. He added that the atmosphere in Longlac at this time is of concern. He said that although many who will lose their jobs are near retirement age, there are many younger people.
