

Students creating their own jobs for summer

High School students across Ontario are creating their own summer jobs by forming youth job co-operatives, summer businesses in which the students share costs, responsibilities and profits.

Gregory Sorbara, Ontario minister of Skills Development, called this "a unique alternative to traditional summer employment," and commended the young people for their initiative and imagination.

Each co-op gives as many as 15 young people, under 19 years-of-age, the chance to own and manage a business together, acquire job skills and develop leadership abilities.

This year there are 25 youth job co-ops, as compared with eight last year. In 1986 they provided summer business experience for 130 teenagers.

Each co-op is initiated and sponsored by a local community group such as a chamber of commerce, a youth trust or a caisse

populaire.

The Ministry of Skills Development is providing resource materials and training sessions to assist organizers of the co-ops.

Resource materials and promotional activities have been developed in co-operation with the Ontario Chamber of Commerce and with Direction Jeunesse, a provincial francophone youth organization.

Twelve of the 25 co-ops are being started by French-speaking students.

Youth co-ops usually offer a variety of services. They may put on a birthday party for a child, answer business phones, clean swimming pools, clean up after a major event, provide care to shut ins and demonstrate commercial products.

Mike Barkwell of the North Bay Chamber of Commerce says, "They find a niche. We feel there is lots of room in a market that

does not interest established business, where these young people can serve the community.

"Last summer we had 14 young people, and we will have about the same number this year. They share executive responsibility, do the bookkeeping, learn marketing skills. They develop an independent approach because they have to make their own way, nobody comes up to offer them jobs."

In the North

Thirteen of the co-ops are being started in Northern Ontario, in: Cochrane-Iroquois Falls, Dryden, Fauquier, Fort Frances, Hanmer, Hearst, Kapuskasing, Mattice, North Bay, Parry Sound, Smooth Rock Falls, Sudbury and Timmins.

Craig Sanders of the chamber of commerce in Fort Frances says, "There is a great need in Fort Frances for entrepreneurs. We are a resource-based single-

industry town, and the big employers are just not hiring, so we are all looking for alterna-

tives. This presents a learning experience for the kids, and they're at the right age for it."
