St. John safety tip

Minor cuts- Small injuries are almost every day occurrences and they should be given first aid attention so they don't become serious.

They are among the reasons that basic, minimum first aid supplies should be kept in your home

and your car. Small cuts and scrapes that break the skin won't bleed enough to clean themselves. They should be washed with water snd anti-

septic soap and bandages. A deeper cut that's bleeding should be controlled with steady, direct pressure on the wound, preferably with a clean dressing,

but with your hand if necessary. Get the victim to sit down and rest, and raise the injured part.

Apply a sterile pressure dressing, and leave it in place, even if it becomes blood-soaked.

If necessary, get medical help. Serious bleeding is life-threatening. You take the same steps, but you must get medical help as soon as possible.
