Crime of the week #41- October 12, 1987 Break, Enter and Theft- Geraldton, Ontario

During the evening of October 3, 1986, a large party was held at the Furlong residence, situated at 720 Main Street, Geraldton, Ontario.

Approximately 40 persons attended this party, which broke up at about 1:30 in the morning of October 4, 1986.

At about 3 a.m., the owner of the residence left and upon returning at noon, discovered his home had been ransacked, and a large amount of currency was stolen.

The stolen property had been in the kitchen cupboards, and was contained in banking money bags and in a shoe box. The paper currency consisted of Canadian bills dating as far

back as 1870 and 1898, and continuing on to modern currency. In all, 200 bills were taken in the theft. The coins consisted of old commemorative coins, complete sets of Olympic coins, old

Canadiain fifty-cent pieces and dollar coins. Some of the currency bore the likeness of Queen Victoria and King Geroge VI. There was also miscellaneous currency, both

paper and coinage from 25 different countries throughout the world. The total value of the property exceeds \$7,000. A small

amount of the currency has surfaced in the Geraldton area, however, it is believed that the majority may have made its way to Thunder Bay and other communities throughout the district of Thunder Bay.


