planned that are presently scheduled to take place, but there are many ideas in the air that need organization to be realized.

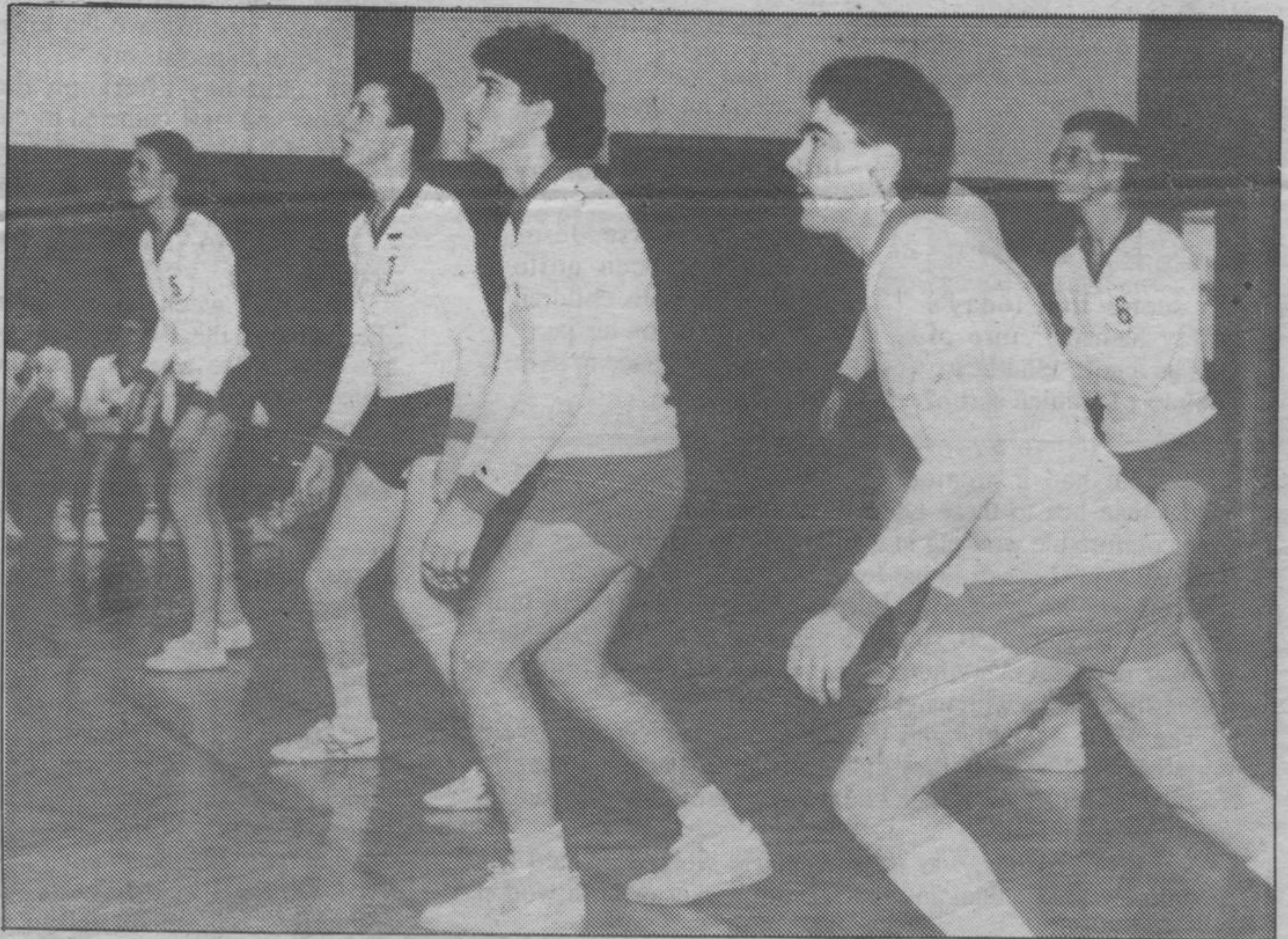
Events already planned include the Games of Winter Show put on by the Entertainment Series and the actual Olympic Torch Ceremony itself.

Chapman's Resigns

In a surprising twist of routine at the Nov. 9th Terrace Bay Council meeting, Ollie Chapman formally submitted her resignation as reeve of the Township of Terrace Bay.

"I feel bad," she told *The News* at her home a couple of days later. "I had hoped to stay a little bit longer. Chapman's 3-year term of office officially ends in December of 1988 but developments not township-related have forced Chapman to resign early.

Plant engineer

The development that cut short early Chapman's term was the hiring of her 57 year-old husband Jack at the Domtar Inc., Forest Products Division in White River as a plant engineer.

Jack had retired early from Kimberly-Clark in Terrace Bay in August of 1986. "He was not ready to retire," Ollie said. "He likes to work."

Jack saw an ad in the newspaper for his present position, applied and got the job. He has been in White River since Oct. 5.

"It is a difficult thing for me (to be leaving now) after being involved with council for five years," Chapman said. She feels council is now on the road and making progress and she feels it a bad time to be leaving.

"Various studies are underway now and I wanted to see them done, be a part of it," she said. Organizing the Canada Day celebration is one area Chapman said she found great pleasure in and one she will miss greatly. Chapman started that committee when Terrace Bay celebrated its 25th Anniversary.
