THE RENT REVIEW GUIDELINE FOR 1988 IS 4.7 PER CENT


The rent review guideline for next year has been calculated at 4.7 per cent. This is the amount by which a landlord can increase the maximum rent for a unit during 1988 without approval from the Ministry of Housing. The rent for a unit can be increased only once in a 12-month period.


The 4.7 per cent guideline applies to all private rental units in the province for rent increases that take effect from January 1, 1988 to December 31, 1988.

The 1987 guideline of 5.2 per cent continues to apply to rent increases which take effect on or before December 31, 1987.

It is illegal for a landlord to increase the maximum rent above the guideline without applying to the Ministry of Housing for rent review to justify the increase. In cases where a landlord does apply for an increase above the guideline, tenants can examine the application and make their own submissions before a decision is reached.
