fighting and they may feel as if they have personally failed as parents.

However, children will probably, at one time or another, try out all different types of behaviours.

Some of these behaviours are approving and will make you proud. Other behaviours will make you feel quite angry at your child.

These behaviours may include lying, swearing, stealing or fighting.

We may be concerned about these disruptive and negative behaviours but what we should be concerned with is how often the behaviour occurs and what kind of consequence it has for the

child.

For example, if you have a two-year-old child who lies about cookies she ate from the cookie jar, this is not as serious as an eight-year-old who has stolen \$20 from your purse or wallet.

What really counts is what type of control you do have on your child.

If you provide an environment with firm but compassionate discipline, your child will probably learn that many of these negative behaviours such as lying, stealing or cheating are wrong.

Then, they may know not to do this any longer and they probably won't (except for the excep-
