

The News went out onto the street this week to ask several residents of Terrace Bay whether they want an A&W.





to sit and translate the transcript. It took an hour for the officer

to finally get some information. In another instance, it was found that an individual was an armed robber who had served 32 years in prison.

Kidder said police handled this and the other situations without knowing all the facts; a potentially dangerous situation.

Police would be aware of persons like this and their history with CPIC.

Kidder informed council there would be no cost to the community to obtain CPIC; the only cost would be the manning of it.

The installation is even paid for by CPIC. All costs of CPIC, including the monthly line rental, repairs and format changes are all cost free.

Kidder said the RCMP is the landlord of CPIC, but in fact not the bosses.

Each police force in Canada has access and availability to all information in CPIC.

CPIC provides protection to the officers and safety to the community.

"Your officers and the commu-

nity are better protected by having CPIC on location," Kidder said.

Council has decided to look

into the possibility of getting the Canadian Police Information Centre.
