Program will be used to attract professionals

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and offer 30 more students awards to study psychiatry and psychology at the doctoral level, and social work and speech pathology at the master's level.

The bursary program is one of the major recruiting mechanisms used to attract professionals to the north. Students are offered one year of bursary assistance in exchange for one year of practice in the north.

"The North has historically experienced problems with recruiting and retaining professionals," said Chris Ward, Minister of Education. "The expansion of the bursary program is one step. However, we aren't stopping there. Together, our ministries and northern community agencies will be looking at a cooperative planning and recruiting method in the short term. The longer term includes a study of the issues to develop improved methods of recruiting

and retaining professionals."

Other features of this model ensure that linguistically appropriate services are available. In designated areas, services will be offered in French. In addition, an interministerial administrative structure will coordinate program development and monitor program operation in cooperation with local community agencies.

The Northern Initiatives for Children with Special Needs will be funded through the Community and Social Services Ministry, \$4.17 million this year and \$6.2 million annually. Once in place, these initiatives should boost the northern economy by creating professional employment positions.

As the initiatives are developed, community agencies and other ministries will be involved to continue the joint planning and development of services for children with special needs in Northern Ontario.

New guide for newcomers

Two new, updated versions of the Newcomers Guide To Services in Ontario are now available in Spanish and English, and Chinese and English, Minister of Citizenship and Minister Responsible for Race Relations Gerry Phillips announced today.

The guide contains information about services provided by all three levels of government and by community agencies to meet the needs and interests of newcomers, Mr. Phillips said.

"This is a very useful handbook which explains such basic information as how to use a telephone directory and public telephone, how to find a job, how to enrol a child in school and how to get a driver's licence."

Other information covers basic facts about employment, education and housing as well as general information on health insurance, family allowance and how to obtain a social insurance number.

"We owe much to the thousands of people from many lands including South American, Hong Kong, Spain and China who have come and made their home in Ontario," Mr. Phillips said.

"We look forward to the continued participation of newcomers in the life of their communities and Ontario."
