Watering Wisdom

Dear John: My philosophy has been to give my lawn an almost daily dose of water. Yet it still looks unhealthy. Why the problem?

Dear Garden Guru: You could be following an unsatisfying irrigation theory. A lawn doesn't want, or need, a watering discipline that provides frequent, shallow soakings. The "golden rule" for residential watering is to water deeply but infrequently, and *only* when the lawn really needs it.

A lawn thirsting for sustenance will fade in color, lose some of its resiliency and suffer from stunted growth. Footprints and mower tracks that remain for several days are sure signs that a lawn needs a long drink to help its root system move deeper into the soil.

Dear John: Can you give me some tips for planting my perennial seedlings?

Dear Chris Anthemum: First, mark the soil with bone meal so you know exactly where to put each plant. Then carefully unpot the plant and dig a hole in the soil large enough for the whole root mass to fit in easily.

Next, set the root ball in the hole so the plant sits at the same depth

as it did in its container. Fill in around the roots with soil, firming lightly.

Once the plant is in place, build a small canal around it 5 or 7 cm out from the stem to trap water and direct it downward to the roots.

Dear John: My wife wants me to buy a riding mower so she can cut the grass faster when I'm away on business trips. What features should I look for?

Dear Travelling Man: When shopping for a riding mower, ask for a test drive and pay attention to the comfort, maneuverability, performance and convenience of any model you operate. Check the mower for noise, vibration, ease of steering, stability on slopes and sitting comfort. Also note the ease of starting and the braking ability. And make sure the mower has a short turning radius for trim work.

The mower should be simple to operate with controls that are easy to reach and engage. Also look for a switch that stops the engine if the driver leaves the seat while the mower blades are under power. A downward-curving shield on the discharge chute can help to deflect thrown objects.
