Crowe, the executive assistant of the Northwest Ontario CATScan Fund, travelled from Thunder Bay on July 28 to receive cheques totalling \$6,033.15, the total of which was canvassed and donated by residents of Schreiber. Presenting the monies are (1 - r): Beth Macadam, chairperson of the local CATScan Campaign; Ken Davis, president of the Chimo Senior Citizens Club; Helen Jartus, co-chairperson of the Fund; Crow; Mike Cosgrove, reeve of Schreiber; and Skip Davis, President of the Legion Auxiliary. Crow told the group that the campaign has already surpassed the half-way mark, and is well on the way to raising the necessary \$1.5-million, but the drive is still ongoing. She said about 25 people per day are benefitting from the CATScan machine, which is located in Thunder Bay, but serves Northwest Ontario.

The Senior Volunteer is a retired Ontario Senior Citizen (at least 55 years old) of either sex, who enjoys reasonably good health, is mobile, knows about his/her community and is willing to commit himself for a year initially to the service of other seniors in his community.

The Senior Volunteer must live in a community with a population of less that 25,000 people and in a community that does not already benefit by the services of a Senior Volunteer.

Once the volunteer has familiarized himself with his own community resources, he/she is then equipped to begin the peer counselling role. The primary service that is provided is one in which the Volunteer acts as an enabler or facilitator.

In addition to the liason role, the Volunteer must also react to individual needs in his respective community by: providing actual service (e.g. visiting a lonely individual in the hospital) or by arranging for others to meet the need (e.g. seeing that he is visited by someone else);

by co-ordinating social events or by planning for community change.

At present, there are 16 Senior Volunteers located in communities across the District of Thunder Bay such as Nipigon, Red Rock, Nakina and Manitouwadge.

These volunteers are playing a vital role in assisting fellow seniors in their home communities.

Profile of Senior Volunteer

Depending upon the community, the Senior Volunteer could be involved in any combination of the following:

visiting a shut-in

· knowing where to refer a senior for assistance or information on Seniors Programs (e.g. Senior housing)
