Justice of the Peace, Don Pahl presided over the November 16, 1988 Provincial Court.

Richard Gionet of Schreiber pled guilty to a charge of "Drive Motor Vehicle Without Insurance." This charge was laid as a result of a motor vehicle accident at Birch Motors and Highway 17, in which Gionet lost control of his vehicle and collided with a vehicle parked in front of Birch's. He was fined \$503.75.

George Raby of Shannonville pled not guilty to "Careless Use of Firearm." This charge was laid after the October 9 incident in which Thomas Desjardins was shot in the left arm while moose hunting at mileage 44 on the Mill Road. After a lengthy trial Raby was found "guilty" and fined \$1,003.75 and prohibited from hunting for one year.


