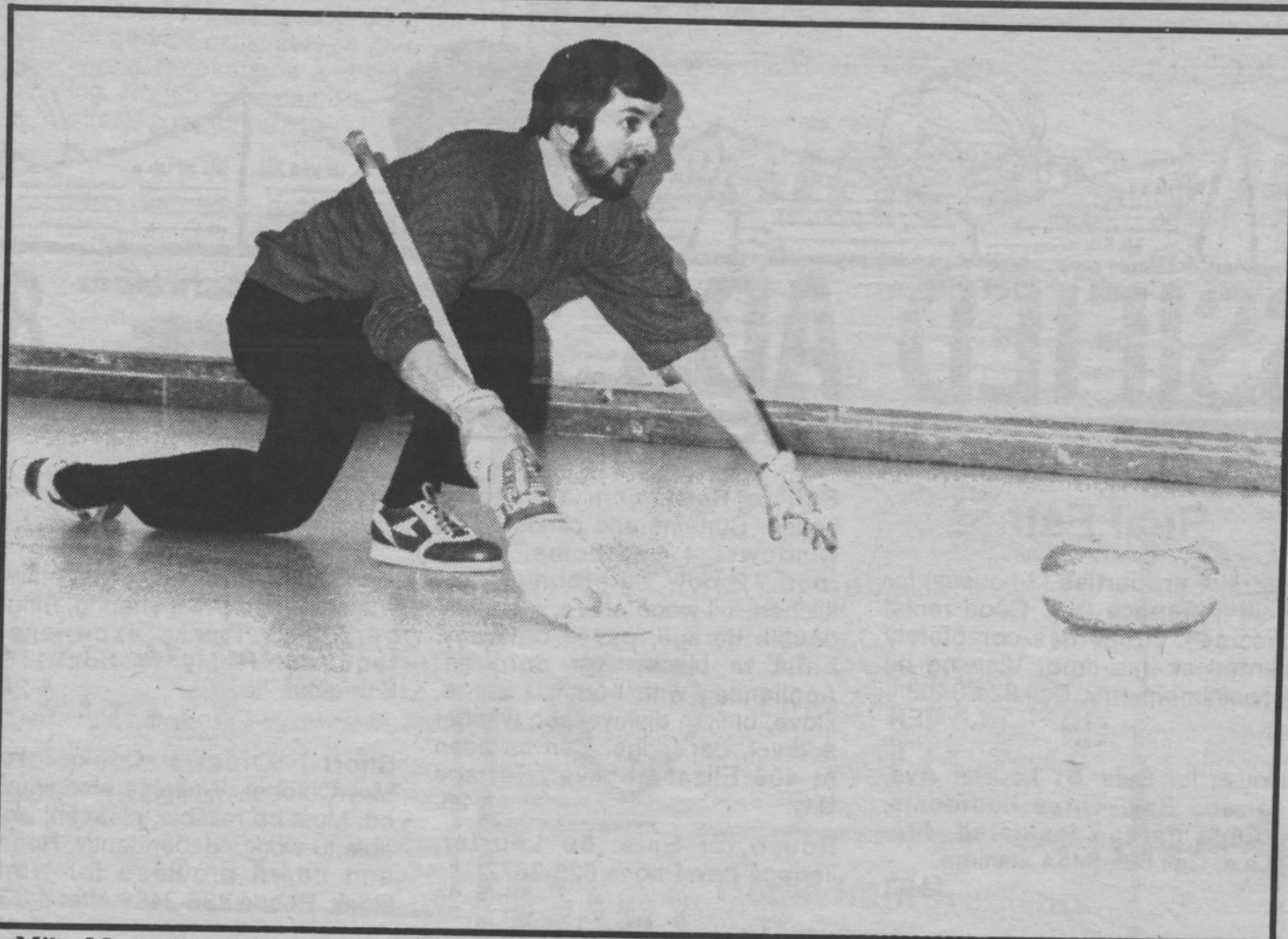


Northern Development Answers

1. The Scots come in third. Close to a million and a half Canadians claim to be part cottish.
2. About 50% of Canadian graduates enter a post-secondary institution.
3. With 70 telephones for every 100 people, Canadians made a total of 36.7 billion calls in 1986, which is an average of 423 calls per person.
4. Canada's national park system began with a small reserve around the mineral hot springs in what is now Banff National Park. National parkland has since grown to more than 180,000 km².
5. Two-thirds of Canadians 15 years and over (13,121,000 people) were in the labour force in 1987.
6. Pearson International in Toronto is the busiest airport in Canada.
7. In 1947 Canada became the first country in the Commonwealth to adopt a distinct national citizenship.
8. Canada is the world's largest producer of newsprint and the second-largest producer of wood pulp.
9. There are 85,000 commercial fishermen in Canada; 77,000 in marine fisheries and 8,000 freshwater.
10. The manufacturing section is the largest segment of Canada's goods-producing industries.
11. Almost 6% of Canada's exports go to Japan.
12. The National Art Gallery has about 40,000 works of art.
