Are you still on speaking terms with your dog?

If you have owned your dog for more than four weeks it is quite possible that you are not on speaking terms with him.

By this time he may have chewed up your favorite pair of shoes, ruined your carpet, run away countless times, knocked over the garbage and devoured the contents, and tampered with your sanity.

But think how he might feel!! You may have him running for cover whenever you raise your voice, panicking when he sees the

lead and collar and hiding his nose if he has an accident. We have a choice when we decide to purchase a dog, unfortu-

nately the dog does not.

No matter what type of dog you choose, a mutt or a purebred

with a mile long pedigree, they should all have the opportunity of being taught obedience the correct way.

Whenever anyone asks me why my dogs are so well behaved I explain that it has taken many hours of work and patience.

If you have a busy lifestyle don't buy a dog.

I have been attending and giving obedience classes for eight years and I'm still learning different methods of training and teaching each year. But the basics never change.

In a class your dog has a chance to socialize with other dogs and people. It also gives you the opportunity to spend the time with your dog that he needs and use this time productively.

In the next few weeks I'll be

writing about the basics to good obedience training.

Do not start training your pup until he is three months old and remember an old dog is never too old to learn a new trick.

The first purchase you must make is a proper collar. A nylon collar for a young puppy or a choke collar for the older dog.

The choke collar is not to string up a dog but is an effective and humane way to give a correction.

Also you should have a six foot leather or nylon leash.


