Belair criticizes Free Trade

which will result in lower operation costs.

Belair cites the example of MacDonald Douglas, whose aircraft plant is located in Malton, Ontario, but parent company resides in the United States. The company is threatening to move

the Canadian plant to the U.S., if Canadian workers do not accept a wage freeze and inferior working conditions.

Belair quotes from the report, "this may be the opening shot at trying to impose U.S. style labor practises" on Canadian workers.

Belair also said that Michael Wilson's first post FTA Budget is an indication that the Government of Canada is laying the groundwork for the upcoming negotiations on the definition of a "sub-

sidy". The Finance Minister has proposed cutbacks in social programs, namely, Unemployment Insurance, Old Age Pensions, Regional Development Programs and transportation (VIA Rail).

Belair added, "it is obvious that the government is preparing to undermine our established social programs in order to comply with the conditions of the FTA. This is only the beginning of a series of changes that will have adverse repercussions on the Canadian economy in the future."

The M.P. also reiterated his election campaign platform that we maintain control of American investments in Canada and of reinvestment of American profits in Canada.

He concluded, "this way, we would be sure to control our economic destiny and ensure our sovereignty."
