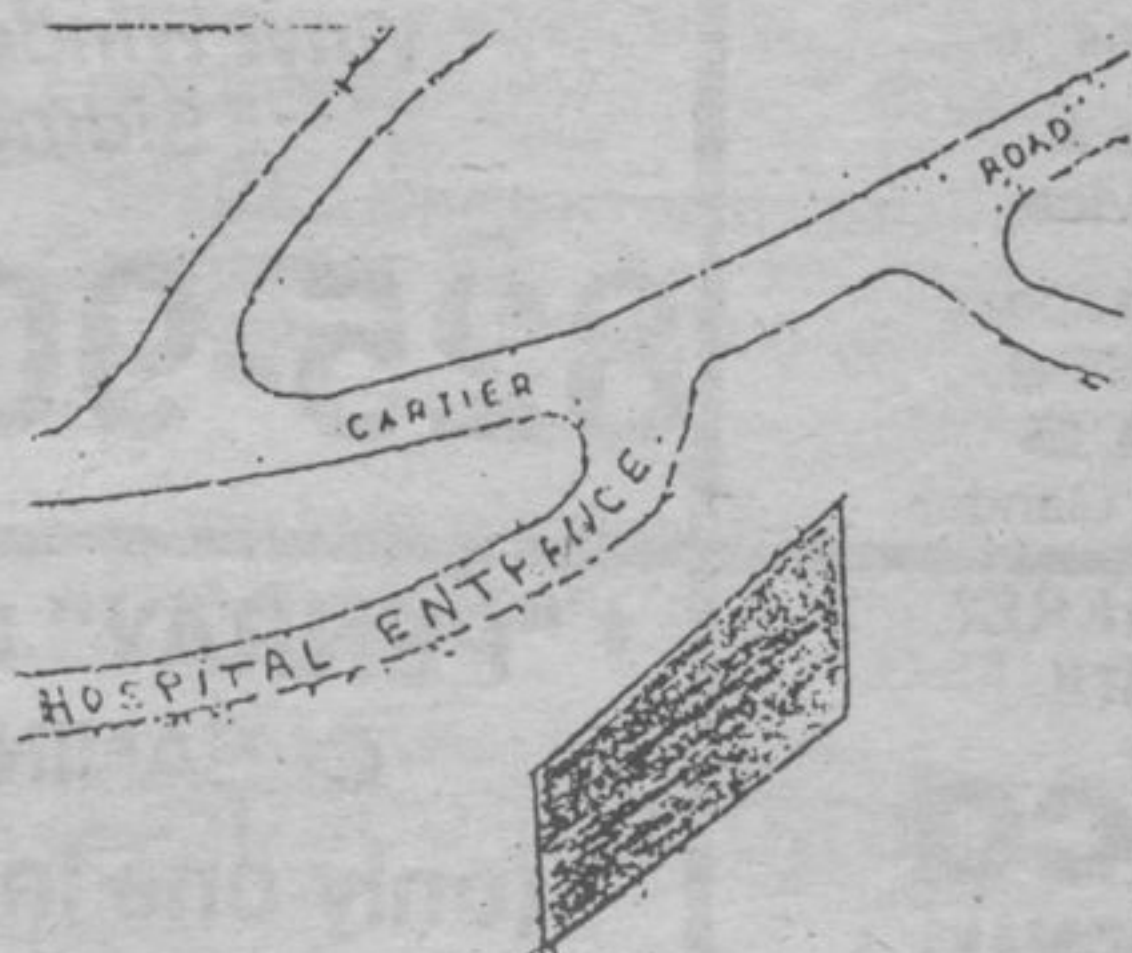

Judges will pick NOB Awards from over 150 nominations

A gourmet feast with a "Northern flavor" promises to delight the palates of 500 guests at the upcoming Northern Ontario Business Awards Dinner, slated for November 8 at the Senator Hotel in Timmins.

Among those in attendance will be Premier David Peterson, Rene Fontaine, Minister of Northern Development and Mines; and Monte Kwinter, Minister of Industry Trade and Technology. Entrepreneurs and executives from across Northern Ontario will help honor this year's recipients of six prestigious Northern Ontario Business Awards.

Past years' winners have included Charles Carter of Great Lakes Forest Products in Thunder Bay, Jim Hillsinger of the Water Tower Inn/Searchmont Ski Resort in Sault Ste. Marie, Lucie Seguin from Lucky 13 convenience stores in North Bay, and George Duncan of Accurassay Laboratories in Kirkland Lake.

The panel of judges will make its choice from among 150 nominations received from across Northern Ontario. According to Suzie Burton, coordinator of the program, "we received 25 per cent more nominations this year. That's an indicator of the growing importance or recognizing excellence in Northern Ontario's busi-

ness community."

Three judges were selected to choose six winners of the prestigious Northern Ontario Business Awards. They are John C. Hopper, president of Hopper Pontiac Buick GMC in North Bay, Helen Gillespie, founding partner in Canadian Shield Spring Water, and Cliff McIntosh, president of Quetico Centre in Atikokan.

The award winners, chosen from 150 nominations from across Northern Ontario, will be announced at an upcoming \$70/plate dinner to be held in Timmins on November 8. Tickets can still be purchased from the offices of Northern Ontario Business.

Hopper has operated his own car dealership in North Bay since 1971. His latest venture is a new franchise offering several lines of import cars by GM. He is a founding member of the Northern Ontario General Motors Dealers Association, and is a director of the Federation of Automobile Dealers Association.

In 1985, Hopper was president of the Ontario Automobile Dealers Association, and is a past president of the North Bay Automobile Dealers Association.

Owner of the North Bay Centennials Hockey Team, Hopper was recently elected vice-

president of the OHL. Among his political activities, he was representative on the North Bay Department of Economic Development and the North Bay Civic Hospital Boards.

He also served on the planning board in North Himsforth, and chaired the Public Works Committee on the Technical Advisory Committee for Highway 11 Corridor Study and the Railway Rationalization Committee.

Over the years, Hopper has been involved in local service clubs, including the Kiwanis, Shriners, and Easter Seals Telethon. As chairperson of the North Bay and district Health Centre's "Campaign for Life," he will head a \$7 million fundraising campaign for improved and expanded health care services for North Bay and surrounding region.

Helen Gillespie is a founding partner in Canadian Shield Spring Water Co. Ltd., started-up in 1985 and based in Sault Ste. Marie. Her other entrepreneurial achievements include a 15 year ownership of the Loon's Nest, a Canadian Handcraft gift shop, and a three year partnership in the Wooden Spoon, a kitchen boutique.

Gillespie, who is a director of the Ontario Chamber of

Commerce, currently serves as president of the Sault Ste. Marie Chamber of Commerce. Among her other activities, she is a member of the Executive Council and director of Hospitality and Travel Sault Ste. Marie.

In 1958 Cliff McIntosh founded Quetico Centre in Atikokan. Quetico originated from a need to develop human resources in the North, and in an effort to achieve this, much of the centre's program focuses on helping people do break-through thinking. McIntosh designed a series of 14 workshops held in different Northern Ontario communities, culminating in a Premier's conference that sparked initiatives in northern entrepreneurship.

Among his many prestigious awards are Member of the Order of Ontario in 1987 and Member of the Order of Canada in 1986. McIntosh also holds an Honorary Doctor of Letters from Lakehead University, and is a Fellow of the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. In 1968 he began a one year appointment as a W.L. Grant Fellow in adult education to the faculty of the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education.

As well as being Quetico's current president, McIntosh is an author, columnist, and public speaker.
