
Homemaker services have been available in Rossport, Schreiber and Terrace Bay for the past two years.

During that time, the service has grown considerably with 12 homemakers working and helping out over 45 clients.

Red Cross recruits, selects, trains and supervises Homemakers. As well, they coordinate services with organizations that provide funding, such as the Thunder Bay Home Care Program, town offices, Department of Veterans' Affairs, the Canadian Cancer Society and family and children's services.




