# Tasty treats for you and your pet

Now that winter has arrived, people and pets are spending more time indoors. If you have some free time and would like to give your pet a treat, try these recipes. The first recipe is for "Jerky for Pets and People".

1 lb. lean beef or lamb. Remove any excess fat. Slice the meat diagonally across the grain into strips 1/8 to 1/4 inch thick.

Marinate the strips for two hours in:

1/4 cup salad oil
1/2 cup soy sauce

1 large clove garlic 1 tablespoon brown sugar

Remove meat from marinade and sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper.

Place meat strips in oven on a wine rack over a drip pan. Heat oven to 175 degrees F. Leave oven door slightly ajar and dry strips for approximately five hours.

Remove when dry but still

slightly flexible. Cool and store in an airtight container in a cool place.

This next treat is suitable for dogs or cats, "Pastries for Cheese Lovers."

6 tablespoons margarine

1/2 cup finely grated cheddar cheese

1 cup all purpose flour

1 small garlic clove minced

Blend margarine and cheese until smooth. Stir in garlic then mix in flour. Mixture will be crumbly.

For dogs, shape mixture into a log about 1 1/2 inches diameter and chill until firm.

For cats, shape into a log 1/2 inch in diameter and chill until firm.

To serve, cut slices about 1/4 to 1/2 inch thick from rolls. Place on an ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake at 375 degrees F about 10 minutes or until slightly brown.

## Almost \$1 million handed out under prospectors program

A total of 100 applications for funding, representing \$897,977 in grants, have been approved for payment under the new Ontario Prospectors Assistance Program (OPAP), Northern Development and Mines Minister Hugh P. O'Neil has announced.

OPAP was implemented Oct. 6 to encourage more grassroots exploration by providing grubstake grants of up to \$10,000 to individuals carrying out prospecting activities in Ontario.

"The implementation of this program reaffirms our commitment to the maintenance of a vital mineral exploration sector as an essential component of the provincial economy," O'Neil said.
