Obedience Training Your Dog

Before you begin any obedience training, you should know the ten commandments of obedience training.

1. Praise your dog when he performs an exercise correctly. This is what your dog is working for - your praise!

2. Correct your dog firmly, when he fails to perform an exercise he knows, if you are sure he understands what is expected of him. Firmly does not mean hitting your dog with your hand, leash, or any other object.

3. Think like a dog. Put yourself in your dog's shoes, and train him accordingly. Don't punish your dog for performing and exercise incorrectly, when it is likely that he doesn't understand what you want.

4. Have patience. If you lose your temper you'll do more harm than good; put your leash away until tomorrow.

5. Do your homework. Your instructor can show how to train your dog - but the important part

is up to you.

6. Get your dog's attention while working with him. Talk to him, or use the leash with the quick snap to keep him attentive. Use tidbits or other training aids if necessary.

7. Don't call your dog to you and then punish him!! He will think he is being punished for coming.

8. Consistency is the name of the game. Your dog will not learn right from wrong if you allow him to do something one day and then punish him the next day for doing the same thing (jumping on the couch, etc.)

9. Be your dog's master. Don't ask him to do something - tell him! A dog will happily obey a master he respects. Moreover, dogs equate respect with love! Never yell or scream your commands.

10. Practice every day, rain or shine. Success in dog training is 90% practice.

ating educational programs is the selection of a control group", also, "a problem, without a solution".

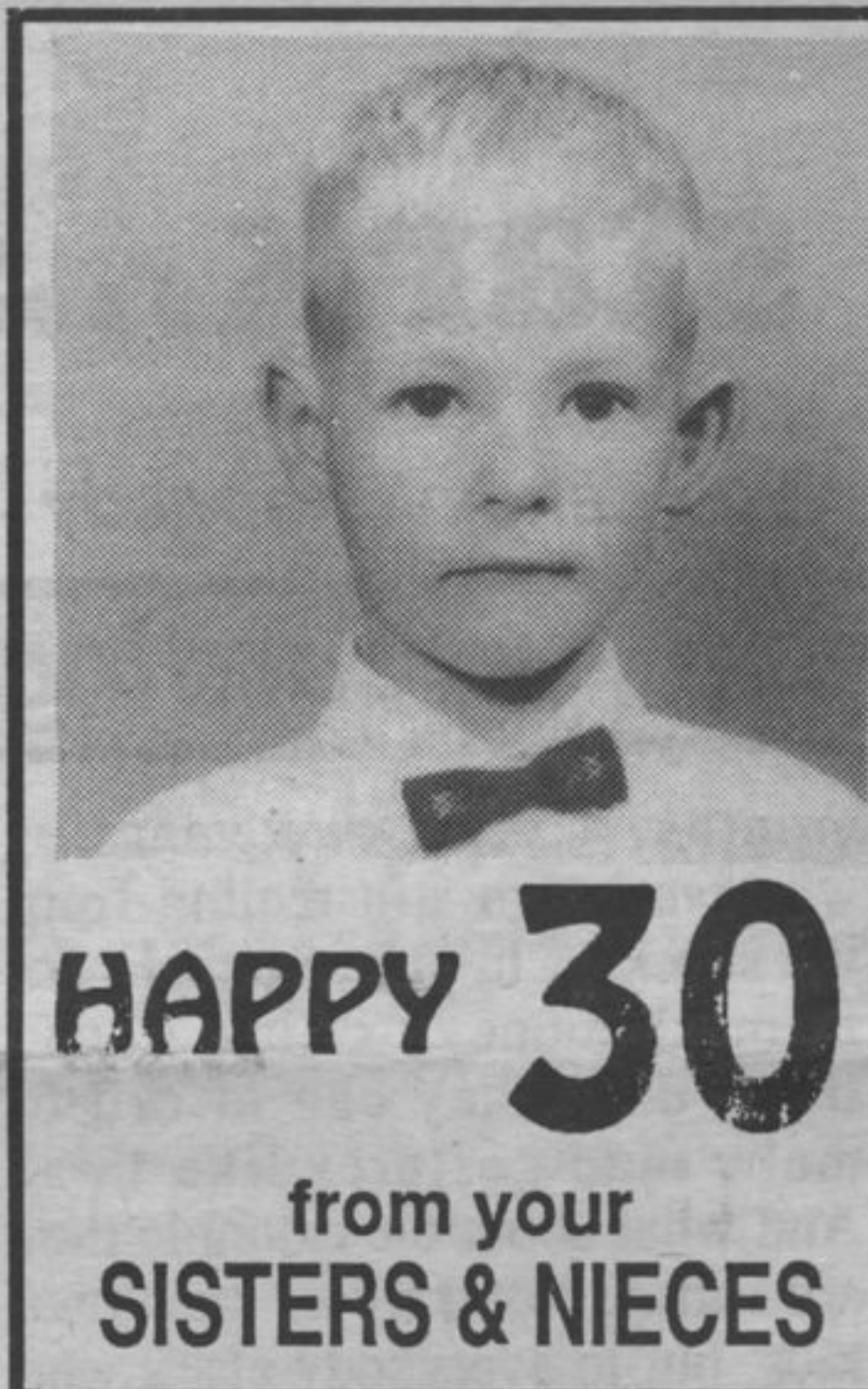
The O.I.S.E. Study "showed that younger children do not necessarily learn faster in Early French Immersion, at least not with a second language".

The Trite Report discovered "even the brightest of children, those who displayed an eagerness to learn and with excellent English skills, were experiencing problems with the early French Immersion program. When they switched to English, they flourished."

A quote in Toronto Life Magazine, March 1986, by Katherine Govier reads as follows, "Immersion is a product of parental demand", "it has been successful because it is backed by a strong lobby group."

A recent study done by the second largest School Board in Ontario, (Ottawa-Carleton) in 1989 reveals that at least one out of every five children drop out of early French Immersion (20%). The drop out rates increase with each year of early French Immersion. This causes serious adjustments back into English classes and requires psychiatric treatment in some cases.

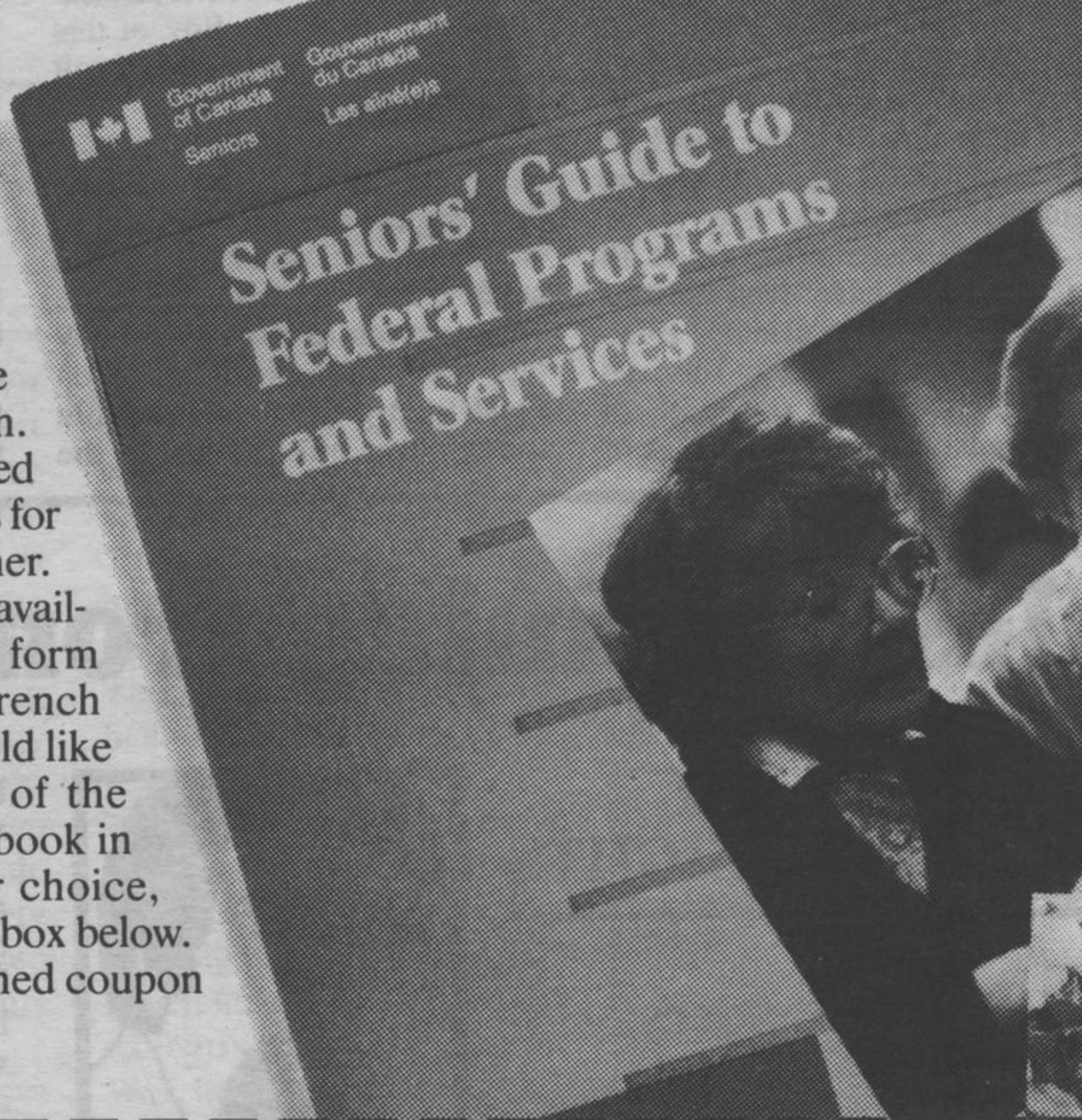
