Use something special for retrieving, something that won't

It is important that your dog does not learn the power of his teeth. Do not play tug of war or tag games, thereby allowing the puppy to grab with his teeth and pull.

# Have you received your Health Card Information Kit yet?

If not, don't wait! Pick up your Health Card Information Kit at any Canada Post Office or the Ministry of Health office nearest you. Fill out the form and return it to us right away so that we can send the new Ontario Health Card which replaces your OHIP card.


## What is the new Ontario Health Card?

It's a plastic card with your name and new, personal health care number printed on it. It gives you the same benefits you received under OHIP.



# How do I get my new Health Card?

By now you should have received our Health Card Information Kit in the mail. Read the instructions carefully, then fill in the form and return it to us right away in the postage-paid envelope provided.



If you haven't received the form, don't wait any longer! Pick one up at the Post Office or local Ministry of Health office.

### Why do I need a new Health Card?

You need it to replace your OHIP card and to show that you are still covered to receive health services.

Your new Health Card is printed with your own personal number.

No one else can use it. It's yours for life.

Until your new Health Card arrives, continue to use your OHIP card.

I am a Senior Citizen. Do I get a new Health Card and a new Ontario Senior Citizen Privilege Card?

Your new Health 65 Card replaces both your OHIP card and your Ontario Senior Citizen Privilege Card. As of July 1, 1990, the one number on the new Health 65 Card will provide you with all the same benefits.



# Why is the system changing?

The Ontario Ministry of Health is changing to a new system that serves you better.

In the past, every member of your family was registered under one OHIP number. Under the new system, you don't have to pay a premium or receive assistance to be covered by Ontario's health insurance. You have your own personal number. This personal number enhances the confidentiality you enjoyed under OHIP and it also permits the Ministry to better understand health trends so that it can plan for future demands on resources.
