Mr. Mayer's grades two and three class at Schreiber Public School made a booth in a follow-up to Earth Day.

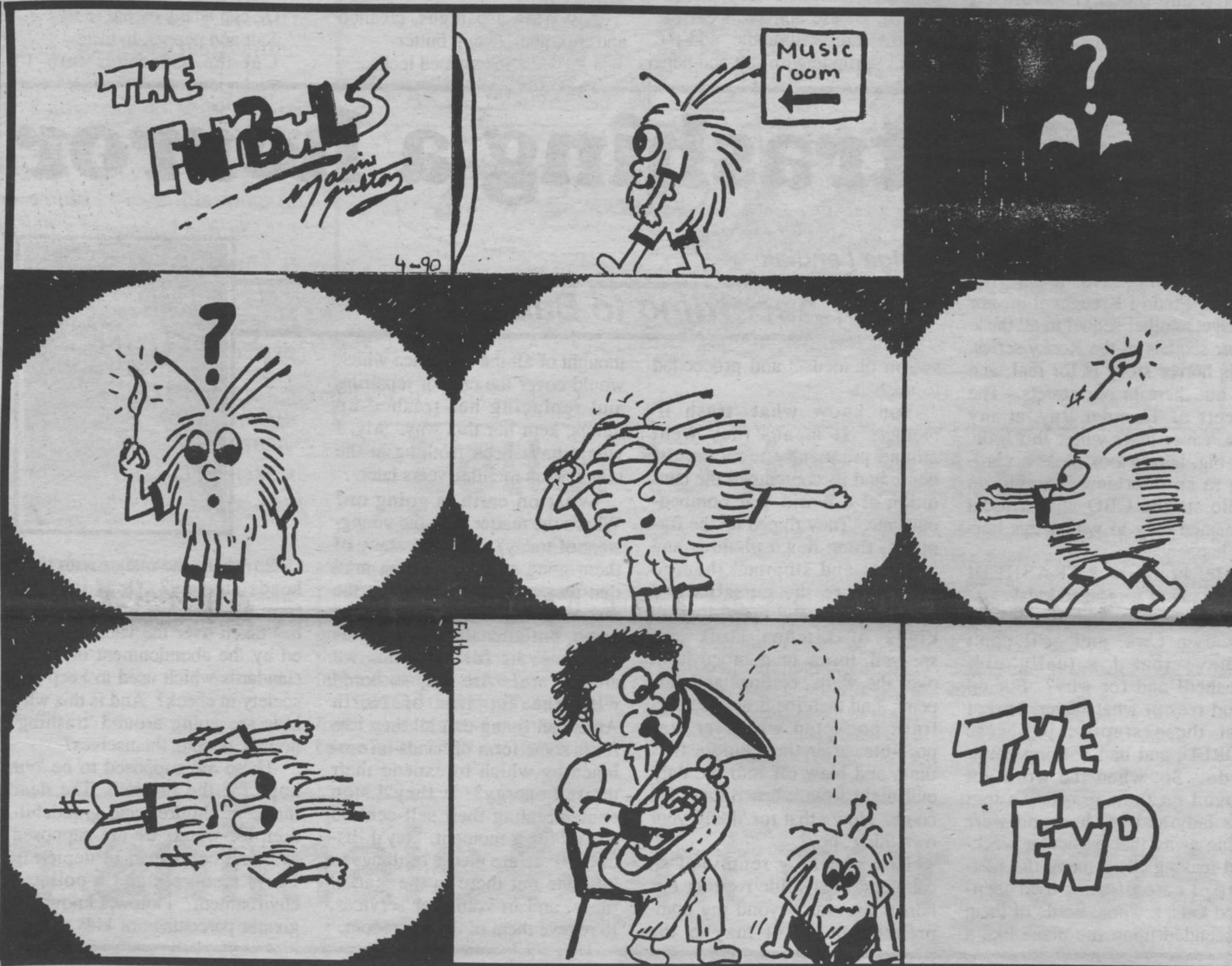
The kids followed the three R's—reuse, recycle, and reduce and placed articles and examples in their booth set up outside the school.

CACCAMO, JOSEPH STEVEN

Joseph Caccamo, aged 74, passed away peacefully on April 14, 1990. Reverend Jan Rademaker officiated and the Legion Padre, Reverend Bob Elkin held a special service with many veteran comrades in attendance. Joe was born in White River, on September 13, 1915. The eldest son of Antonio and Clara Caccamo, he moved to Schreiber with the family in 1919, where he remained. He was educated at Schreiber High School and at St. Boniface, Winnipeg. He joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1937 and later served as a rear gunner with the R.C.A.F. until the end of the war. He returned to Schreiber, and was employed by C.P.R. for many years. He retired from the C.P.R. to join in the family business, Caccamo Ltd. He later went into partnership with Joe and Jim Figliomeni at the Schreiber Foodmarket, where he retired in 1980. He was predeceased by his Mother and Father and brother, Hugo. He is survived by his loving wife, Penny; daughter, Debbie; and son-in-law, John Gross of London; only son Greg and wife Patti, of Schreiber; two brothers, Gino and wife Frankie, of Schreiber; Jack and wife Rita, of Thunder Bay; and sister-in-law, Mrs. Doreen Stevenson (nee Caccamo), of Thunder Bay. He leaves many nieces, nephews, and cousins, as well as his beloved grandchildren, the joy of his life. Amber, Alison, Erica, Kelly, Jenny-Lyn and Stanley Earl, were a very special part of "Their Bapa's" life. For many years Joe was an active member of the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 109, and served on the executive many times. Egg prices move down

Canadian consumers will welcome news from the Canadian Egg Marketing Agency (CEMA) that producer prices for eggs have

been lowered effective immediately.

Consumers should expect a corresponding decline in retail egg prices, except in cases when eggs have been on special.

Producer prices will fall 5-7 cents a dozen depending on the province. The producer price is based on a Cost of Production formula and is adjusted on a provincial basis to allow for actual production cost differences.

The price is also adjusted to reflect seasonal variations in demand under CEMA's new seasonal pricing policy.

"Seasonal Pricing accounts for

the current drop", according to CEMA General Manager Gerry Gartner. "Demand for eggs always slows in the period after Easter and it is therefore appropriate that prices should fall," he explained.

Seasonal pricing is an example of CEMA's commitment to market responsiveness. This policy reduces industrial product removal costs while leaving producer returns unaffected in the course of the calendar year.

The current price reduction comes at a time when the cost of most food and consumer items are on the rise. Egg prices continue to go against this trend as revealed by the most recent Agriculture Canada retail food price report.

In the month of February, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) of eggs rose from only 0.7% from one year ago whereas the CPI for all food purchased from stores increased by 1.2%.
