Schizophrenia- the misunderstood disease

Schizophrenia is a biochemical disease of the brain. It is an illness which tends to surface when there is stress and it tends to run in families. It causes changes in one's thinking, perception, mood and behavior. It is not a split or multiple personality, as often confused by the public.

Schizophrenia is a serious illness that is more common than most of us think, It is a very misunderstood illness, and this misunderstanding creates, for those affected with schizophrenia and their families, a stigma and a huge burden.

I would like to attempt to clarify some of the misunderstandings associated with schizophrenia because, those with this illness, and their families need and

deserve support and understanding.

Approximately 250,000 suffer Canadians from schizophrenia, and many more will develop it at some point in their lives. Worldwide there are about 40 million people who have this illness. Obviously, numbers are not a reason for misunderstanding.

Is it possible that we think it is an illness that occurs when one is older? This too, is a poor reason for misunderstanding because it usually hits people between the ages of 15 and 25. This means that one has schizophrenia for many years, not just their last 5-10 years.

One reason our understanding of schizophrenia is minimal, is that there is no known cause or cure for it. Fortunately, it is not the hopeless illness it once was; now supportive therapy and antipsychotic medication have made it possible for schizophrenown communities.

Another reason why schizphrenia is poorly understood, is that we may be personally fearful of losing our own sanity. this is an extremely difficult concept for each of us to handle. We may also fear that schizophrenia patients are violent. In actuality people suffering from mental illness are no more violent than those suffering from cancer or diabetes. Most patients will withdraw and isolate themselves because they are very inhibited and afraid of real life situations.

Schizophrenics and their families need and deserve support and understanding. They don't need the STIGMA;; they already have the illness. Those affected with schizophrenia are human beings, and certainly deserve the right to be treated as such.
