Lamprey program on Lake Superior

Mr. S. M. Dustin, Manager of the Department of Fisheries and Oceans' Sea Lamprey Control Centre, has released the following information pertinent to the field program on Lakes Huron and Superior for 1990. The Department, acting as the Canadian Agent for the Great Lakes Fishery Commission, has the responsibility for performing sea lamprey control in the Canadian waters of the Great Lakes basin, and in the United States (New York) tributaries of Lake Ontario.

Sea lamprey control depends mainly upon the carefully controlled application of selective toxicants (lampricides) to streams harboring sea lamprey larvae. At proper intervals (normally three to five years) retreatments are necessary to prevent the escapement of reestablished sea lamprey populations. Detection and eval-

uation of sea lamprey larval populations is the function of stream survey teams who systematically examine all Great Lakes' tributaries using electro-shockers or a granular formulation of lampricide. Assessment of sea lamprey spawning runs is carried out through the use of portable traps fished in selected streams, and is also by means of permanent traps incorporated into sea lamprey barrier dams which are being built to prevent lamprey access into headwater areas of difficultto-treat tributaries.

Sections of the following tributaries to Lake Superior are scheduled for lampricide during Cranberry Creek, Harmony River, Goulais River, Chippewa River, Batchawana River, Carp River, Michipicoten River, Pic River, Gravel River, Cypress River, Wolf River, and Neebing-McIntyre Floodway.

Although exact dates of treatment cannot be set at this time, it is expected that these streams will be treated during the period of late May through September.

The lampricide selectively destroys larval lamprey but is non-toxic to humans, pets, livestock, and other animals. Some non-target fish species may be

killed if they are weakened through spawning activities or by environmental stress, disease, or pollution. In addition, any aquatic organisms such as bait minnows, that are confined artificially in the stream water, may be susceptible to the lampricide because of crowding and handling. Those who keep such

organisms should consider using an alternate supply of water during the treatment period.

Stream surveys will be conducted on approximately 47 Lake Huron and 75 Lake Superior tributaries, in a continuing effort to identify and evaluate new or reestablished populations of larval sea lamprey.


