she continued, "and if my window is open the table is covered in dust."

The Ministry of Environment had put in a Hi-Vol unit to measure dust samples in the Semple's yard.

"The Ministry of the Environment tell us the samples are within guidelines, but they don't know what the guidelines are," Debbie said, "They don't know if they're dangerous or not because there are no guidelines for a transfer site in a town. The Ministry of Health needs to set guidelines but keep beating around the bush. They won't listen to you. It's at the point where I'm a nervous wreck."

Rose Renaud claimed that R. T. Yates' whose farm is right next to the site, has been feeling the effects of the concentrate. Rose said, "In the spring Reg has to scrape black scum off his pond. He uses this pond as his water

source!"

Dr. Eric Rogers, the present locum in Schreiber, feels that people concerned about their health should get blood and urine tests to show that there are chemicals in their body. He mentioned that cadmium is the most toxic of all.

"You've got to trace what's happening into a person's body," said Dr. Rogers, "You need scientific proof. If you have scientific information, they have to listen. I don't know if the people in the area are contaminated or not."

"Put your money where your mouth is," Dr. Rogers said about people who are worried about their health, "If you could show 4 or 5 people that show chemicals in their blood or urine that would be proof."

Rose Renaud has written to the Thunder Bay Health Unit to see if they will pay for cadmium tests but has not yet received an

answer.

Rose said, "Dr. Rogers said that only two or three have to come back positive."

Rose and Mike Renaud are also conducting a confidential survey in Schreiber over the next couple of years. The survey asks a few questions pertaining to health in regards to the mineral concentrate.

The Concerned Citizens Committee of Schreiber would like to see the mineral transfer site moved out of town to a non-populated area or copper and zinc concentrates being transported in sealed containers from the mine site to their destination.

They say they are not opposed to Minnova nor wish to offend C.P. Rail. they feel that zinc and copper concentrate should be treated with more respect to their potential toxicity to the environment and the health of local residents.

Criminal Court Report

Provincial Court was held in Schreiber on the 30 May 1990 with the following charges being resolved. Provincial Judge R. Mitchell presided.

Nickalos Chopty of Terrace Bay pleaded guilty to Drive Motor Vehicle with over 80 mgs alcohol in his blood and fined \$400.00. His license was prohibited for one year.

Lloyd Fairservice of Schreiber pleaded guilty to the same offense and was fined \$600.00. He also received the mandatory one year license prohibition.

Wayne Sheppard of Schreiber was convicted of Impaired Driving with over 80 mgs of alcohol in his blood. He was sentenced to 14 days in jail, and prohibited from driving for 2 years. He was also placed on probation for a period of 6 months.

On Friday, June 1, 1990, Peter Gutta of Schreiber was sentenced in Thunder Bay concerning a break-in, extensive damage was done to the equipment and interior, as well as numerous articles of clothing, including several formal dresses for graduating High School students. The articles of clothing were slashed and mutilated.

Gutta was sentenced to 18 months in jail and ordered to pay restitution in the amount of \$1817.00.

Reading Program receives funding

Reading Rising Literacy program gets MNM funding

"Reading Rising", an adult literacy program in Schreiber, will receive a \$3,700.00 provincial grant to buy equipment, Northern Development Minister Rene Fontaine has announced.

The grant will help the group establish a resource centre where learners are matched with volunteer tutors, who help build reading skills with the help of training materials and equipment.

"The fight against illiteracy is being waged at the grassroots community level, where volunteers make a commitment to teaching reading and writing skills," Fontaine said. "It is appropriate that in this, the International Literacy Year, this organization is attempting to assist those who need help achieving what many take for granted."

The literacy program for adults in Schreiber, Terrace Bay, Rosspoint and Pays Plat has so far helped 49 people improve their reading skills over the past three years.
