## New firearms law could encourage law breaking

Portions of the federal government's proposed firearms legislation could actually promote law breaking, says the Ontario Anglers and Hunters (OFAH).

A 400 per-cent hike in the cost of Firearms Acquisition Certificates (FAC) is unwarranted and will have a negative effect on the control of and legal use of firearms across Canada, said Rick Morgan, OFAH executive vice president.

"I am convinced that the \$50 fee, by itself, will prompt many otherwise honest Canadians to break the law," he said. "Firearms will be illegally sold and loaned to friends acquaintances unwilling to shell out \$50 and that is wrong."

In addition to the fee hike, proposals to implement a 28-day waiting period for FAC approval, and the requirement of photographs and references, may further complicate firearms control, he said.

The OFAH is also concerned that new limitations on clip sizes may render many previously common and lawful firearms useless. It's unknown if smaller clips are available for many currently law abiding citizens.
