Ideas presented for future development of Terrace waterfront

 Suggestions for the future development of the Terrace Bay waterfront were presented at a public meeting on Wednesday, September 5. Paul Young and Bill Crompton with the Cumming Cockburn Ltd consulting firm have been studying the area for almost two years. The three specific sites highlighted in their presentation were the Aguasabon beach, Lyda Bay and Hydro Bay. Many suggestions for short-term improvements at the Aguasabon beach were made. These included the installation of slips at the current boat launch to
