Highway construction is sometimes very disruptive to our travelling; however, it is something we have to live with for obvious reasons.

Bridge repairs were being done on the Little Pic River located 30 kilometres west of Marathon along Highway 17, which required two generators to operate caution lights. These lights warned oncoming motorists that there was construction ahead and to use care when crossing the bridge.

The two generators, one on either side of the bridge, were stolen between 9:00 p.m., the 25th of April and 6:00 a.m., the 26th of April. The thieves cut heavy chains to free the generators which were chained to concrete blocks. This theft made a hazardous situation even more dangerous.

The generators were described as a Honda model CJ 0183 and a Polyquip model PGX 3400D.

The possibility exists that these generators were stolen to

supply power for someone's camp or recreational vehicle.

Each generator costs \$2,500 to replace.

The Marathon Crime Stoppers Board of Directors will pay a cash reward for the arrest of the person or persons responsible for this theft. The Board will also pay for the recovery of one or both of the generators.

The money is handed out through a code number system. Others in Marathon have taken advantage of the cash offer. The Township of Terrace Bay will join other municipalities across Ontario in observing 1990 Building Regulations Awareness Week on September 23-29, Reeve Jim Ziegler announced today.

"Whether it's the building in which we live, work or play, sound and safe construction is something that concerns every one of us," said Reeve Ziegler.

The purpose of Building Regulations Awareness Week is to educate the public on the importance of the Ontario Building Code regulations and the need for proper plan review and inspections. The theme of the week is "Be Smart---Build Safe".

The municipality of Terrace Bay encourages its citizens to recognize the need for building regulations and the benefits of obtaining building permits and inspections. The public is further encouraged to consult with and obtain building permit applications from the Township's Building Inspection Department (Township Engineer's Office) to ensure that all Provincial Building Codes and Municipal By-Laws will be adhered to prior to commencement of new construction and / or renovations to existing structures. Brochures explaining the How's and Why's of Building Codes and Building Permits are available at your local building supply centres and the municipal office.

Building Regulations Awareness Week is sponsored by the Ontario Buildings Officials Association, which represents 1800 Building Officials across the province, and endorsed by the Honourable John Sweeney, Minister of Housing for the Province of Ontario.

"The importance of the Ontario Building Code and its implementation is often overlooked until lives are lost through some structural failure or fire", Syl Allard, O.B.O.A. President said. "By getting people to think more about building construction regulations, perhaps we can prevent such tragedies."

Township of Terrace Bay Public Notice

Residents of Terrace Bay & Schreiber

The purpose of this notice is to remind the public that burning at the landfill site is not permitted. On August 28 and 31 and again on September 4th fires were lit in the domestic trench by person(s) unknown. In each case the fire department was called in to extinguish the fire.

The Township of Terrace Bay By-Law no. 20-89 for the control of open fires in the municipality specifically states:

" There shall be no burning of the following:
a) trash or other garbage
b) tires, oils, tars, plastics, roofing or other building materials."

The by-law further states that a person found guilty of an offence is liable for a fine of not more than \$2,000.00, exclusive of costs.

The Ministry of the Environment has banned the burning of domestic garbage throughout Ontario. They have advised the Township that they would revoke the current Certificate of Approval for the landfill site should this practice continue.

The Township is requesting the public not to start any fires at the landfill site. Thank-you.
