

MNR ready for moose hunters

receive tags for either adult, male or female moose. The tags must be pinned to the moose when it is shot. Hunters apply for the tags, which are limited in numbers, and are granted them through a lottery-like process.

"It still seems in this area, moose tags are easier to get," said Baldwin, comparing the area to others areas which are more accessible and closer to major centers, such as Thunder Bay.

Along with hunting season comes the job of ensuring hunting is being done properly and safely. This is what the MNR conservation officers try to do.

"All of us (conservation officers) will be out in the field making sure the laws are being followed," said Baldwin, who added

that another important part of the job is ensuring that hunters are careful when using firearms. "That (safety) is one thing our officers are worrying more and more about," he said.

Baldwin says that those who break the laws are a small minority of the hunters.

"We do have some violations," he said, "but the majority of the hunters are good sportsmen - and conservationists."
