Municipality assists eligible seniors with property taxes

Residents of Schreiber Township who are over 65 and own their homes may be eligible to receive assistance in paying their property taxes.

Schreiber Township Council passed a by-law at last Tuesday's meeting that will give eligible property owners half of the difference (up to \$150) between their tax bill and the amount provided by the provincial elderly property tax assistance program.

Clerk-Treasurer, Aurel Gauthier, said eligibility for the grant requires that a person be over the age of 65, live in Schreiber Township, pay property taxes on the home of residence and receive the Federal Old Age Supplement.

"Not everybody gets that," he explained." If you have a big pension for instance the Federal Old Age Supplement doesn't kick

Gauthier said the federal supplement applies generally to people who are on a small pension.

The province has an elderly property tax assistance program with a maximum of \$600 that applies to everybody over 65 regardless of the federal grant.

It is the difference between this provincial grant and the property owners tax bill that the Township will use to determine the amount it will grant.

"For example," Gauthier said, "if your taxes are \$800, the province will give you \$600. That means you pay \$200 in property

Under this new by-law the township will pay half of the difference up to \$150. Using the example above the property owner would receive \$100, bringing the total tax bill to \$100.

Drivers are responsible for buckling up young children

October is seat belt safety month and both the Schreiber detachment of the O.P.P. and the Terrace Bay Police want people to be more aware of how the seat belt law applies to themselves and their families.

Drivers are responsible for buckling up children until they reach the age of 16.

Infants who weigh up to 9 kg (20lb) must travel facing the rear in child restraint seat.

Children who weigh between 9-18 kg (20-40lb) must travel in a child restraint seat. When a toddler travels in a vehicle other than its parents or legal guardians, a

lap belt may be used.

Pre-schoolers from 18-23 kg (40-50lb) are required to use the lap belt portion of the seat belt assembly. It should be worn securely fitted low on the hips.

The back seat is always the safest place for the child's car seat because it is away from the hazards of the windshield, dashboard or steering wheel.

It is not safe for a child to be held on someone's lap. If the vehicle comes to a sudden stop no one can hold onto the young-

Take proper care of your children by buckling them up.

Terrace Bay Police Notes

Telalert

There will be a test of the Telalert system in Terrace Bay in the near future.

Telalert is a system that has been devised to alert businesses that crimes of a specific nature are being committed in the area.

The Terrace Bay Police Force might receive telexed notification from the Canadian Police Information Centre, for example, that someone was passing counterfeit bills in communities west of Terrace Bay and were moving eastward.

The police then contact two businesses to inform them of the situation. Each of these businesses will in turn contact two more businesses and so on.

It is a fan-out system that allows the police and the business community to co-operate in crime prevention, said Chief Kidder of the Terrace Bay police.

Telalert has gone into operation twice already with one instance bringing positive results.

RIDE Program

The RIDE program in Terrace Bay will be in effect on Hallowe'en.

Chief Kidder said the program will continue right through the holiday season until Easter,

"We now have funding for it," he said, "\$4,500 has been given to the community for the RIDE program from the Ontario Office of the Soliciter General."
