

- Q: I'm thinking of buying a new car in 1991. How will the proposed GST affect prices?
- A: The outgoing Federal Sales Tax (FST) is now part of the price of new cars. So, while they will be fully taxed at 7% in 1991, the expected effect of replacing the FST with the GST on the average \$22,000 mid-size car is a reduction of around \$850.
- Q: My son has figured out it will cost \$500 in lumber to build a dock at our cottage if he bought it now. How much will that lumber cost with the proposed GST?
- A: You can expect to pay about \$512 for that same amount of lumber for personal use based solely on the changeover from the FST to the GST.
- Q: I know the proposed GST won't apply to city bus fares but I take the commuter train to work. Will I have to pay GST?
- A: No. Daily commuter trains are considered a municipal transit service, so fares are exempt from GST.

And if the numbers in the Senate are numbing, those characterizing the prime minister's personal popularity are stunning.

Our prime minister, according to the most recent polls, has a popularity rating of 15 per cent, lowest in recorded history since Edward the Eye Eater of Prussia.

Warrants for Arrest were issued for Steven Balsor and Reijo Karajaoja.

John Bryson of Terrace Bay pled guilty to a charge of impaired driving. He was given a \$1,000 fine and his license was suspended for a period of one year.

Trent Desaulniers of Terrace Bay was found guilty of impaired driving on a Terrace Bay Police Force charge. He was given a \$500 fine and his driving privileges taken away for one year.

John Jenkins of Schreiber pled guilty to theft and breach of recognizance. He was ordered to pay restitution to the victim for the money he had stolen (\$290). Jenkins had served a week in jail for the offense prior to court on November 14, 1990. He was also placed on probation for a 12 month period.

Next Criminal Court in Schreiber will be Wednesday, January 16, 1991. But let's put this in proper perspective.

But the Senate could be his undoing. the G.S.T. fight is far from over. Yes sir, as the Liberals in the senate like to say: "It ain't over until Pat Carney sings."
