continued from page 5 essentially the same thing, even though they don't agree in public.

"I held a constituency clinic in Nestor Falls. All of the tourist operators come to me and say: damn that Boise Cascade. All those buggers do is put in more logging roads everywhere, they're putting us out of business. They're filling in the creeks and the spawning beds, and it seems like this whole constituency is just dedicated to Boise Cascade.

"Next week, a trapper comes into my constituency office and he says I bought this trap line - come out and see how much of it is left. Boise Cascade has cut the whole damn thing, there's nothing left out there to trap. All the animals that are worth trapping have buggered off."

"Then I go talk to one of the native bands, and they have the same complaint. And then I go to an Anglers and Hunters meeting, in Atikokan or Fort Frances, and I hear the same thing. You sit back and draw the conclusion that what we've been doing in this part of the province is we've let pulp and paper companies dictate to the rest of us exactly what should happen. And maybe that's not wrong. But when I listen to everyone, the conclusion I get is that a lot of us are not happy with the way we've been developing our land, and using our resources. And if we're not happy with it, we have to come to some common agreements about what should happen. And it's not going to be easy."

Hampton's right. It's not going to be easy. Economic times are already hard enough, without working up some kind of mass animosity towards pulp and paper companies that

provide much needed jobs. At the same time, Hampton and Hillsinger are making sense when they make a plea for new partnerships - a willingness to sit down and work together on resource management issues, rather than leaving it up to the courts - or the politicians - to make the tough choices.
