Northern Insights

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If Washington is softening its position on the softwood tax - a tax which has had devastating economic consequences for northern Ontario - is it really because three of our warships and some of our CF-18s were committed to the Gulf? Or does it have more to do with the economic policies of Ottawa, which has kept the Canadian Dollar artificially high, thereby making Canadian exports of all kinds (not just softwood lumber) uncompetitive? With an overvalued Canadian dollar, the Americans are less afraid of allowing Ottawa to drop the 15% tax.

The real reasons for Washington changing its position on the 15% tax might be fuzzy, but the consequences for northern Ontario are clear. This region is losing an industry - perhaps permanently. By losing sawmills we not only lose jobs, but also the ability to put our trees to the most efficient end use - taking larger logs to sawmills, and making the chips into pulp.

At the same time, we cannot ignore the fact that Ottawa chose to impose that 15% tax on the Canadian sawmill industry, leading up to the Free Trade talks with Washington. As a sovereign state, do we have to impose domestic harm on ourselves, just to please the elephant next door?

Or, even if we follow Mulroney's policy of being friendly with the elephant, do we have to support the elephant's foreign policy, just to get the Americans to consent to a change in our domestic policy like the removal of the softwood tax?

The next time George Bush chooses to exert America's military might, instead of letting trade sanctions work out a peaceful solution to a world problem as he did in Iraq, will we mice squeak up? Or will we do the elephant's bidding, hoping for yet another concession?
