



Community Vision workshop held in Rossport

The Rossport Area Conservation and Development Group held another Community Vision workshop at the Rossport Community Hall, May 3 -4, that was designed to take stock of important community developments since the first workshop held in April, 1990.

The 1990 workshop drew up a statement of Rossport's community principles: favouring controlled development, preserving the natural environment and enhancing the village's high level of community cohesion.

"The 1990 Vision Statement also set out a list of objectives, many of which have since been accomplished," said Mary Burnett, chair of the RACDG.

""A citizen-run Management Board has been created for the Rossport Islands and the Burnett said.

Rossport Tourism Opportunities study has been completed."

The 1991 workshop began with reports from the Island Management Board, the Local Services Board, the RACDG, the Rossport Recreation Committee and the Rossport Fish Derby Committee. Saturday questions for a community survey to go out in August were drawn up.

"We want to find out how everyone feels about the important decieions that the community has to make in order to allow Rossport to move ahead."

The survey results will be analyzed and discussed by all local organizations and should guide the community as it moves into the future,
