"We understand the need for the cuts and we are doing our best to do as much as we can in those few hours."

However, she added, some of the staff haven't forgotten that management has ignored their opinions and not considered their feelings.

The cutbacks have also resulted in changes within all departments at the home, which is operated by the Thunder Bay District Homes for

the Aged.

For example Phillips pointed to staff members, formerly cleaners, who are now working in the dietary department.

Also, there is one former member of the nursing staff now working in the maintenance department.

Phillips said the individuals chose to go to these areas for their own reasons. For example, one wanted to work steady days instead of shift work.

A Ministry of Labour report on the layoffs at Birchwood is expected to be released very soon.

During each 30 minute performance, the volunteer riders take their machines through a series of complex patterns which are intended to demonstrate the maneuverability of the machines and the skill of the riders.

The best time to see the Golden Helmets is during a night performance. The combination of noise and dazzling lights produces an exciting and memorable event.

Training for the O.P.P.' precision team usually starts in the late spring, depending on the upcoming performance schedule. The routines must be memorized and executed to perfection before the public gets to see the new team. Although a nucleus of the team stays on from year to year,

there are always changes and new members have to be trained.

The team does between 20 - 30 performances in a season at fall fairs, air shows and as a kick off for charity events. After each performance, the team park their motorcycles at the performance site and greet the public. The team has performed for the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police, the F.B.I., Canada Week in New York City, the celebration

of the Queen's Silver Jubilee at Queen's Park, the opening of the Skydome in Toronto and numerous other functions.

The Ride Master is Sergeant John Arnold of Whitby Detachment. Sergeant Arnold has 24 years O.P.P. riding experience with the last 15 years as the Force Motorcycle Instructor. The "ride" is under the direction of Traffic Sergeant Robert Lyon, Traffic Programs Coordinator, Traffic and Marine Branch.

Menon sees Jeff organizing and working in many areas of school, including student council, yearbook committee, stereo club and the student's advisory council.

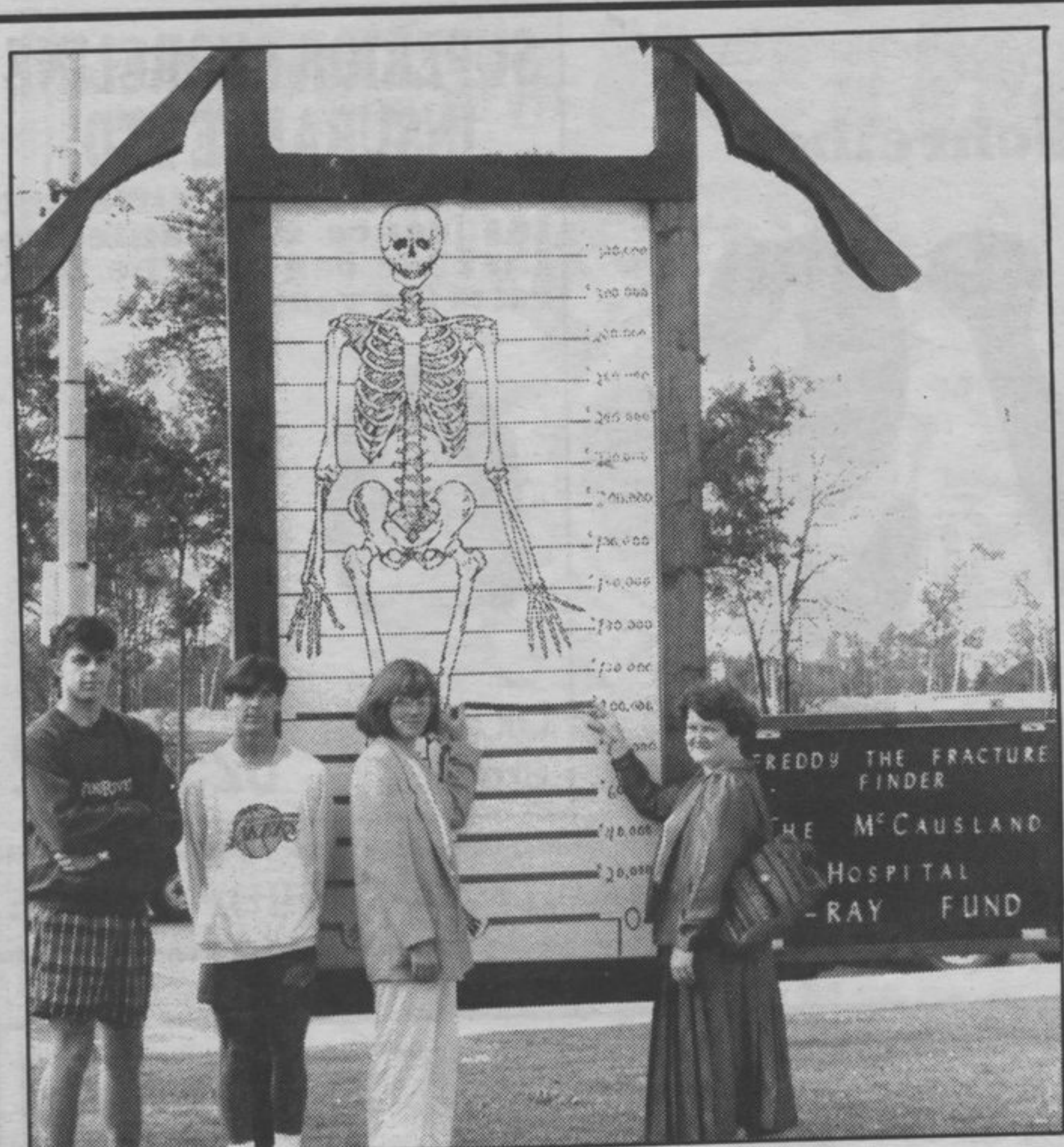

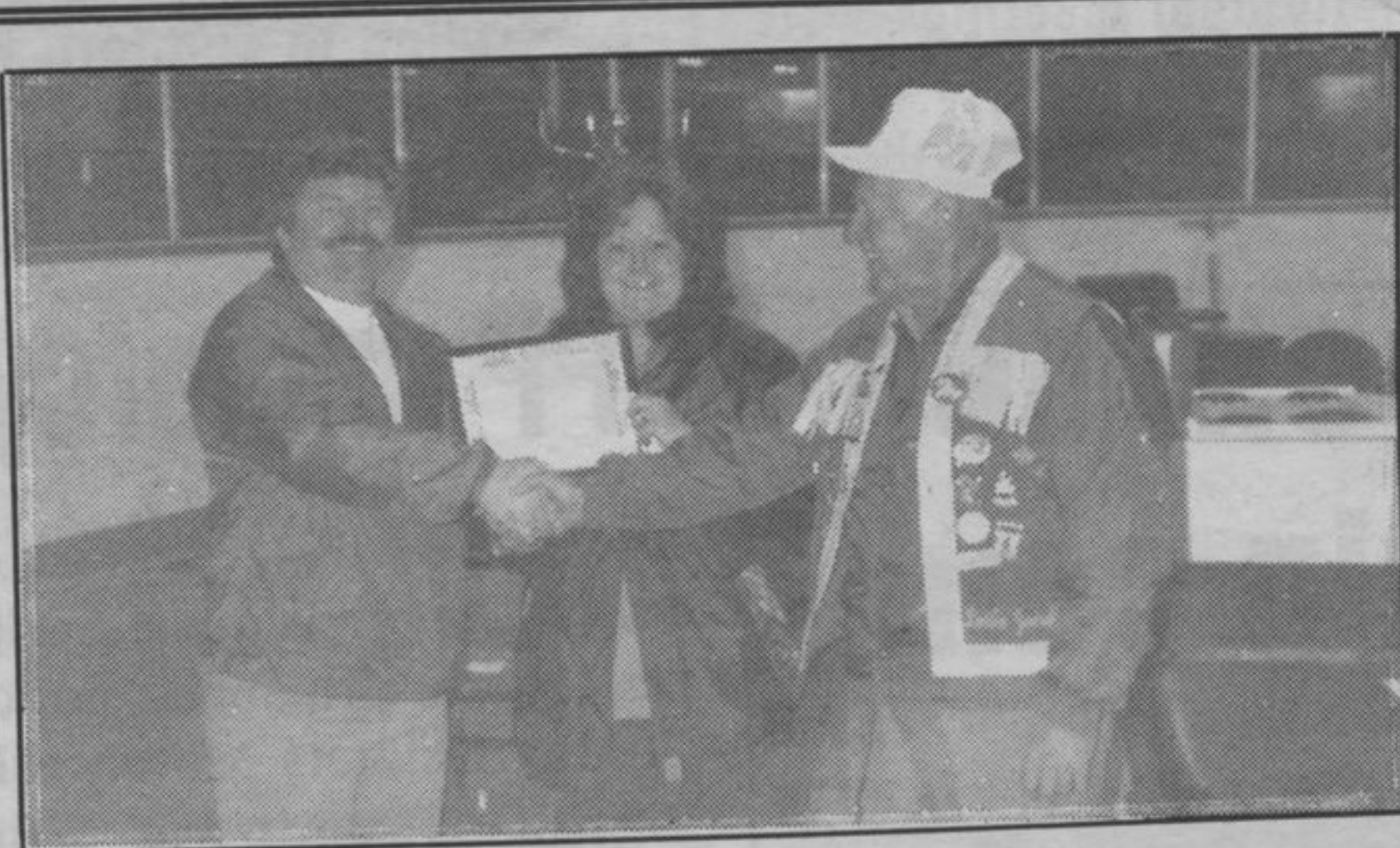
