Disaster plan put into practice

A collapsed high school gymnasium roof injured 25 students in Terrace Bay on Tuesday, June 4.

Two Lake Superior High School students, Tosha Veinot, 16, and Paula Doucet, 15, were sitting outside of the building when the roof fell in.

"It just crashed down on them," said Veinot, " around 30 students were taking a gym class."

Doucet said it took 3-4 minutes for the ambulance to arrive on the scene.

"The first ambulance driver to arrive asked to help, carrying flashlights and oxygen," she said.

The interior of the gym was in total darkness and the cries of students asking for help could be heard from outside.

One ambulance attendant had the area secured and was communicating with the ambulance station and the hospital while others were evacuating students.


A school bus was called in to take students who were injured, but could still walk, to the hospital.

Veinot and Doucet assisted the walking injured onto the bus and stayed with them until they reached the hospital.

In fact what happened was an exercise to monitor the McCausland Hospital's Natural Disaster Plan and the response of the various departments involved.

A press release from McCausland Hospital said, all local agencies, such as Terrace Bay Police Services and the Terrace Bay Fire Department, were informed of the exercise, however there was no actual involvement on their part because the mock disaster was set up to to test the Hospitals disaster plan.

"As with all exercises of this nature, many positive points were noted which were originally addressed in the Natural Disaster Plan. New points raised will be included in the Natural Disaster Plan," the release said.

The students of Lake Superior High School were made-up with fake wounds indicating various degrees of injury and played their part by providing authentic sounding screams of pain and confusion.

Feigning shock and disorientation, some of them even tried to wander away from the accident site.
