Voyageurs invade the Northshore

The canoes slid quietly from the mouth of the Aguasabon River and into the waters of Lake Superior just as the sun topped the hills in the east.

This morning, Sunday, July 14, these paddlers, university students and members of an expedition commemorating the journeys of Canadian explorer Sir Alexander MacKenzie,

were en route to RosSPORT, the next stop in their sea to sea expedition.

The modern day voyageurs had arrived in Terrace Bay the previous day, after a six hour paddle from Marathon.

"Paddling Lake Superior has been an interesting experience," said Jim Smithers, professor at Lakehead University and leader of the expedition.

"We had more fog than I

expected - almost every day."

The paddlers left Sault Ste. Marie in their 36 foot canoes at 6 a.m. in a very dense fog and "ricocheted along the shoreline for about four hours before the fog lifted, Smithers said.

They then took on the challenge of Goulais Bay, a five mile crossing, only to have the fog roll in at the half-way mark forcing them to navigate
