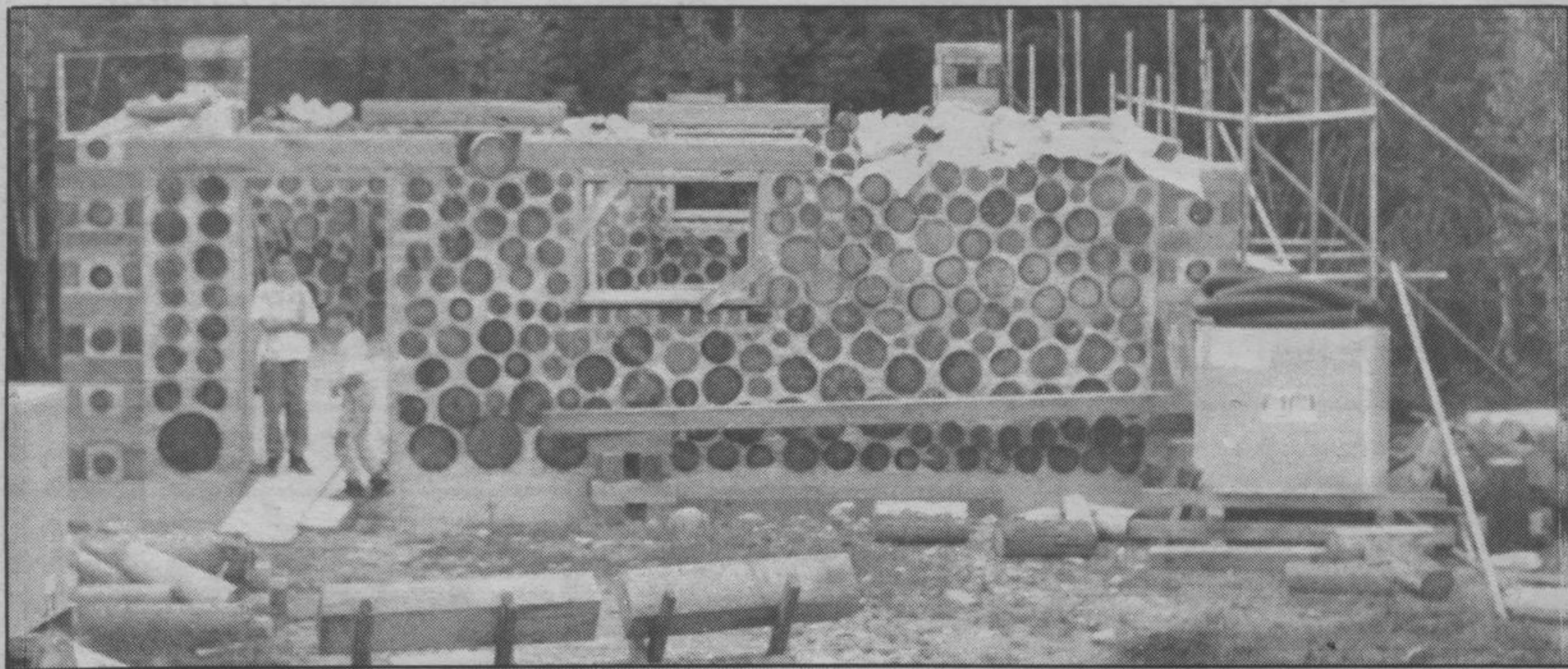
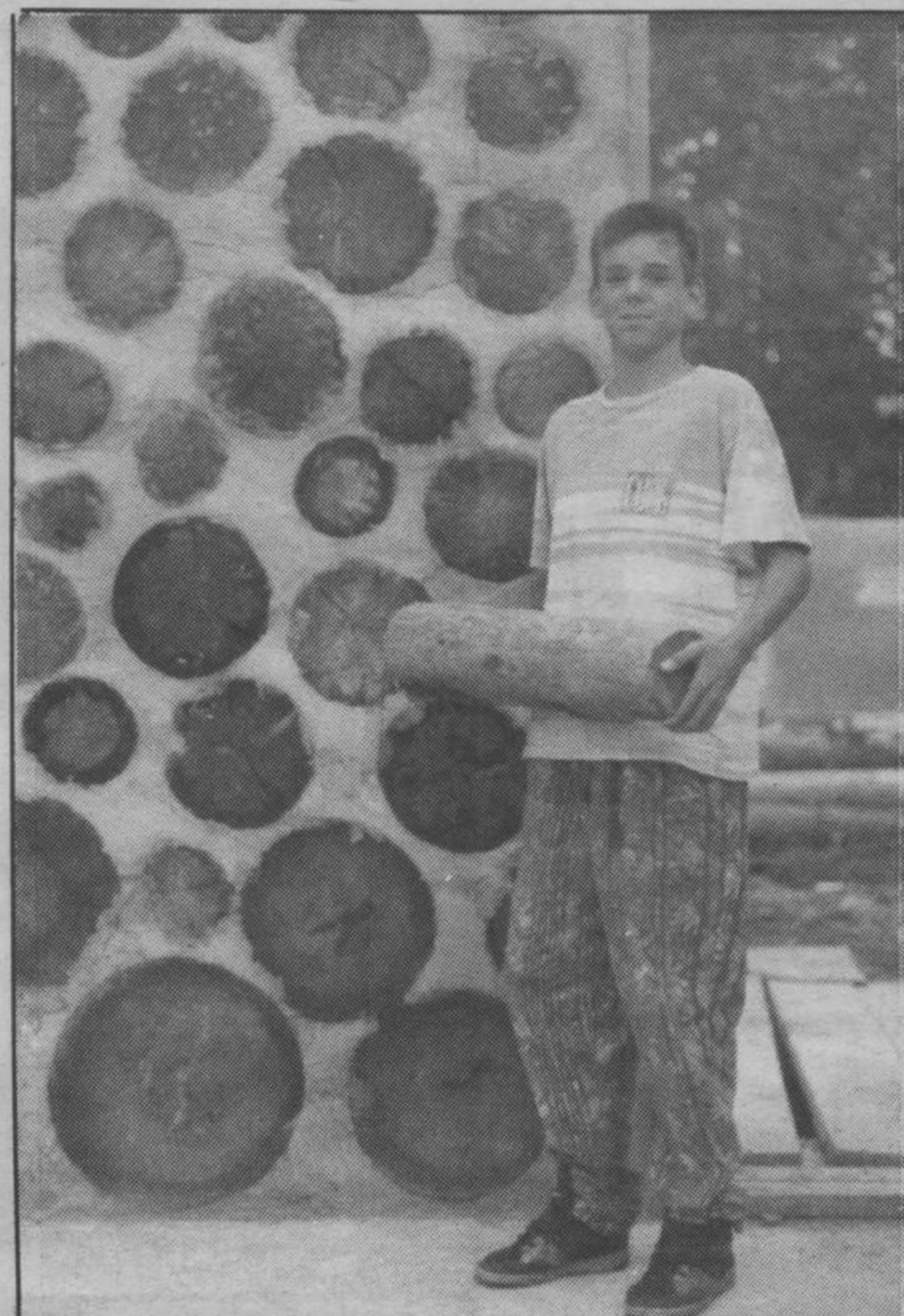


New stackwall cabin for White Sand Scout camp

Terrace Bay Boys Scouts are nearing completion of the stack wall cabin they have been building at White Sand Lake.

The concrete slab for the 32 foot by 28 foot building was laid last fall and volunteers have been working on the building itself since June. The walls of the building, constructed by stacking logs set in masonry on top of each other, will be ten feet high.

The logs used in construction have been cut from telephone poles provided by Bell Canada and Thunder Bay Bell. Based on logs with a one foot diameter, approximately 12 long cords of wood have been used in the construction. The cabin will have a gambrel roof which will provide a loft for sleeping quarters.

The building is on eight and a half acres of land

owned by the Terrace Bay Boys Scouts and will be used by Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Guides in the area.

The new building, with a woodstove for heat and a gas range for cooking, will allow the children in the Scouting and Guiding programs to camp year round.

This project was made possible through grant of \$22,500 from Wintario, help in the form of materials from Ontario Hydro, Township of Terrace Bay, Minnowa, Bell Telephone, Thunder Bay Bell, and the work of volunteers. Local contractors also assisted in reconstructing the road to the camp. More help is needed if this unique and interesting project is to be finished this fall. 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Pet Talk

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Not all people decide to purchase a pure bred dog. Many people enjoy owning a mutt and have for years. If you decide that is what you would like for your family, then here are a few pointers towards picking the right dog.

Look for a dog who will be medium sized, 20-40 pounds, with short to medium length hair.

See if the upper and lower jaws are the same size and if the teeth fit well together.

Does the animal move normally or does it swing its hips from side to side? This can be a sign of hip dysplasia.

What colour is the coat? White dogs carry more genetic problems.

Watch to see how the dog acts. Is it aggressive, clinging, fearful or hyperactive? Avoid these types of personalities.

Make sure the eyes are clear of any infection and not runny.

Move your hands over the dog or puppy to check for sores, infections or bumps that could be a hernia.

Choose the dog who is friendly and listens attentively to your voice.



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
