## Temp. sewage sight

Schreiber Township has given R.C. Cesspool permission to temporarily use the town's sewer system.

The company empties septic and holding tanks for people not connected to the municipal sewer system in the Walker Lake area.

The waste is then dumped into drybeds, which are land tracts where the waste can dry out. When it has dried out, it is moved to a landfill.

R.C. Cesspool has run out of drybeds, however, and has been unable to get approval from the Ministry of Environment, the Ministry of Natural Resources, and Terrace Bay Town Council to establish new ones.

So Schreiber has agreed to let the company dump the waste into its sewage treatment system until the company can get approval for a new drybed area.

## O.P.P. has bikes

The Schreiber OPP are asking anyone who's missing a bicycle to come and see them.

They have received a number of lost bikes in their detachment, and would like to return them to their owners if possible.

Their offices hours are Monday to Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

## New stop signs

Three new stop signs have been erected in Terrace Bay.

Town Council approved a new by-law allowing for the signs on Sept. 30.

The signs are located at the southern corner of Hudson Drive and Selkirk Avenue, the northern corner of Laurier Avenue and Selkirk Avenue, and the northern corner of East Grove Crescent and Terrace Heights Drive.

## Curling tax woes

The Schreiber Curling Club lost a bid to have its tax burden eased.

Town Council refused the club's application for a grant to help pay its outstanding taxes.

In turning down the request, Councillors ruled that since the Club has made progress on reducing a bank loan it took out to renovate the club, and that the club's taxes were remitted in 1987 and 1988, the curlers shouldn't get any more help.

The best the club could get is an offer from council to negotiate a monthly payment schedule.

## New hydro rates

Effective Jan. 1, the average electricity bill in Ontario will go up around \$7 a month.

"We know the impact this increase will have on our customers and we've tried to be sensitive about that," Hydro Chair Marc Eliesen said.

"But our electricity system is aging, and parts of it need to be replaced or refurbished."

More than half of the increase is caused by the Darlington Nuclear Generating Station coming into service, and other nuclear costs.

The increase will raise the average monthly bill for 1,000 kilowatt-hours to about \$78. This is an 11.8 per cent

increase, which is about average, Eliesen said.

## Family dramas on tour

Performers from Thunder Bay will be touring Terrace Bay with two plays from their "Family Life Theatre", which uses drama to express social problems.

The first play, "Life Sentence", is a story about a young girl's torment with incest.

The second, "Cycle of Fear", is the story of a battered woman. The plays will be performed in the Terrace Bay High School Oct. 18.

Each performance will be followed by a question and answer period.

The tour is sponsored by The Ministry of Northern Development and Mines, so admission is free.

## Ont. gov't initiative

Christine Broughton, Terrace Bay Deputy Clerk Treasurer, has been appointed the local representative for a committee looking into the long-term care of seniors and the disabled.

The committee will eventually produce a report that recommends ways government should orient their long-term health care policies for seniors and disabled persons.

The consultation process

will begin later this month, and is expected to take 5 months.

"We're purposely trying to stay away from professionals, and hear from the people on the front lines of health care," Broughton said.

## Air quality study

An Environment Ontario survey of the air around Kimberly Clark showed "no visible symptoms of air pollution injury to vegetation."

The test was conducted around a 22 hectare basin used to process liquid effluent from the kraft pulp mill.

Scientists exposed bags of moss to the area around the basin for a period of a month.

The moss was then examined, and the results were compared with other moss samples that had been placed in the area before the basin had been established.
