

Bursary gives major boost to x-ray fund

Originally set up to encourage students going into medicine

The Freddy the Fracture Finder fund has received a major boost of more than \$6,000, thanks to the liquidation of a bursary originally intended for prospective medical students.

The McCausland Bursary

Fund was set up in the 1960s, when a special day was set aside to honour Dr. McCausland.

"All of his babies from all over Canada came for it," said Marge Hamilton, who administers the bursary.

Those who came to honour Dr. McCausland donated

money toward a fund, which later became the bursary.

It was awarded to students planning a career in medicine, but because of a lack of eligible students, the \$300 bursary was later made into an academic award.

But despite the relaxed requirements, Hamilton says students weren't taking advantage of the bursary.

"In the last three years, we've only had one application for a \$300 bursary," she says. "We had to do something about this."

Hamilton says that when she approached Dr. McCausland's four daughters about liquidating the bursary, and donating the proceeds to the hospital's x-ray fund, they were initially reluctant.

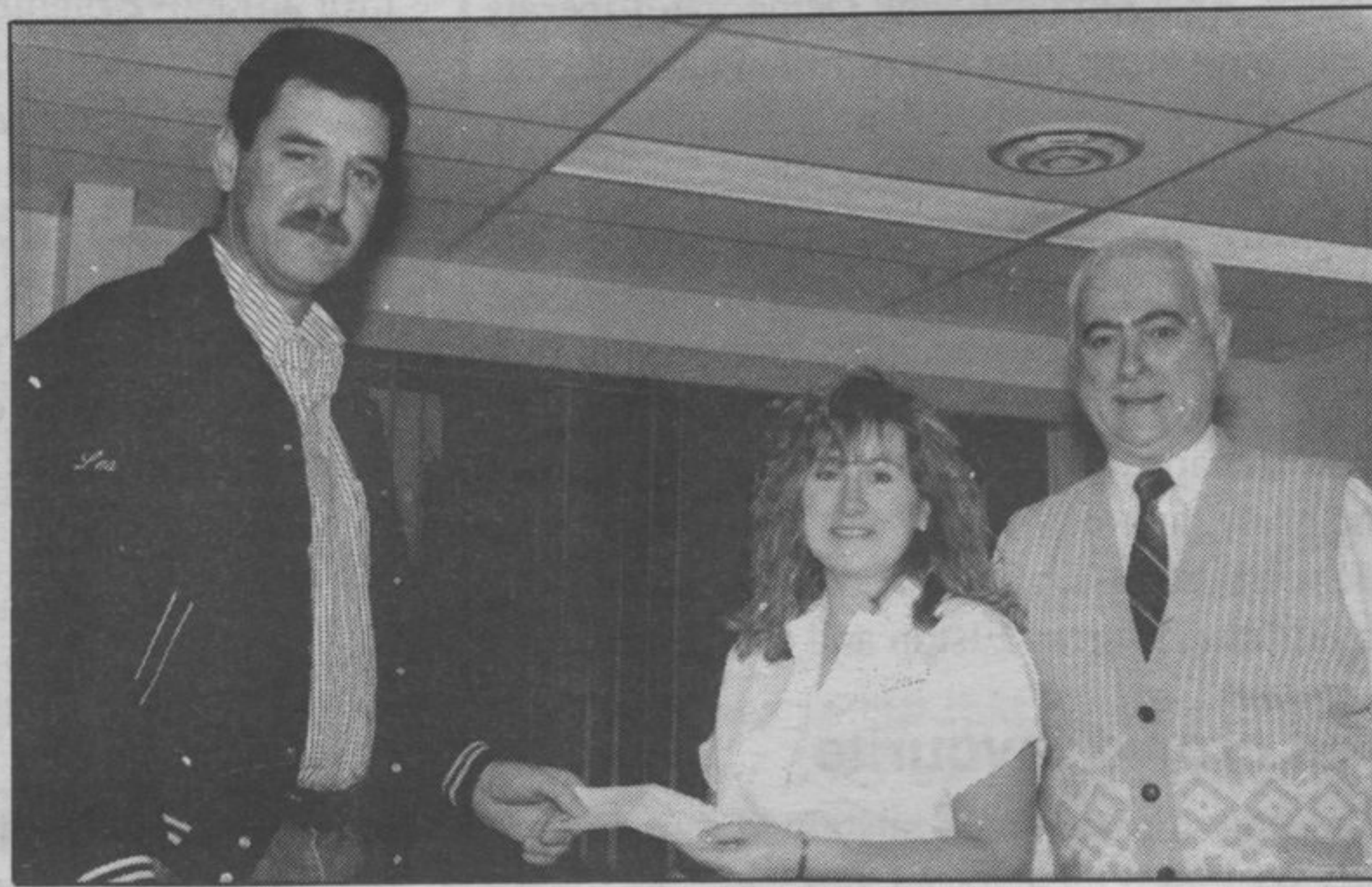
But once they realized the lack of interest in the bursary, the daughters agreed with her assessment, Hamilton says.

"They said they were sure their father would approve," she says.

McCausland C.E.O. Clem Fewer agrees.

"The bursary was not being used," he says. "This way, (DR. McCausland) will live forever."

of the programs he started, such as the Parent Advisory Committee, which gives parents input in how the school is run.

"But we have to accept (the board's) decision," she said. "After all, they're the elected officials."

"If they had told me before 'We're not happy with you, would you please leave,' I would have been happy to go on my way," Balan Menon said.

Menon said he has filed a grievance against the board with the Ontario Secondary School Teacher's Federation.

"If they succeed, (the school board) will be destroying my career," he said.

Menon said he left 23 years of seniority and a retirement gratuity of \$40,000 when he left his previous job to come here.

"There is such a thing as due process and just cause, and I didn't get it," Menon

said. Menon said his two major concerns as principal were to improve the course selection for students and to improve relations with the community.

"I would like to emphasize that one of my major concerns is filling up classes in Schreiber (campus of LSHS)," he said.

"That was one of my major objectives for next year—to make sure that Schreiber is full."
